



or today, I will be borrowing the title of an inspiring movie about the days of racism in South Africa, to bring you this story from Dr. Scott Hahn about a father and a son. In a small community in Afghanistan there was a father who brought his tenyear-old son every day to school. He would constantly remind his son that whatever would happen he should remember his promise that he will be there to pick him up after school. And so, day after day would pass and the father would faithfully be there to pick up his son.

On one particular afternoon a powerful earthquake struck the town as the father was on his way to pick up his son. Buildings and houses were flattened in every direction the father looked. And barely had he regained his balance when the father took off in the direction of his son's school. Cries of grief and grimace filled the air and his worse fears were confirmed when he saw his son's school building flattened.

His heart sank. But immediately he recalled from the rubble he was facing the approximate location of his son's classroom. He called out his son's name several times and was met only with a stony silence. He clambered onto the rubble and started to dig with his bare hands. After a few minutes some other parents and other people came around. Some shouted out that it was useless to dig seeing the extensiveness of the building's damage. He shouted back that they can at least try for one or two hours. Some joined in and they dug and dug. Two hours, three, four passed. They continued. Six, seven, eight. Some started to go home. But the father continued. Twelve, fifteen and then twenty-four. Alone, he continued. Thirty. More people gathered shouting to him about the futility of his efforts. Thirty-eight. Hoarsely, he shouted his son's name. A voice replied, "Papa! We are here!"

It was his son! After confirming their condition, he requested their patience as he gathered more people to help him dig them out. That day along with his son they saved fourteen other children. The son, beaming before his classmates, declared, "I told you my father would come because that's what he promised me!" The power of one.

We also have such promise from a father. That we can find in God the Father. But the intensity of his love and faithfulness for us is so much more. We may be buried deep within the bonds of sin, hatred, unforgiveness, lust, materialism, corruption, what have you. But He never stops digging and calling out our names wanting with such a great desire to bring us into a new life. Unlike the human father, the Almighty Father has a big advantage. The human father above the rubble can just hope and shout for his son without certainty whether he can be heard or not. God from above sends His Holy Spirit without any hindrance from anywhere or anything except from our own free will. And for as long as we hear Him and accept Him, His Holy Spirit will transform and refresh us through our trials, raising our hopes. And once our hopes are raised, we can turn to those beside us who like us were formerly hopeless and tell them the reason for our joy and hope. That's the Good News!

Who knows? It may be a spouse, your own children, of-

fice-mates, bosses or subordinates who are wrapped in this hopelessness and blindness of our earthly life. They may not last long in the rubble of life without hearing the voice of the Lord. And guess whose responsibility it is to let them know that there is hope beyond the rubble of this world? YOURS, MINE, OURS!!! But to start with, it just needs the POWER OF ONE. YOU! Then God takes over.

In this Year of God the Father let us keep this story close to our hearts and know that the responsibility of evangelization cannot be just left to the clergy. There will always be people beside us waiting to hear the right voice. The voice of mercy and salvation that will lead us to Eternal Life with the Almighty Father who loves each and everyone of us like no other.

ca: What initially seemed such a big responsibility as a couple to lead BCLP 7 was turned by the Lord into a personal message and blessing. Barely weeks after the start of the course we learned that Dessa was pregnant. This was a complete shock to us considering that her last pregnancy was eight years ago and we were not keen on having another baby. Surely in view of everyone's ominous forecast of hard times ahead, another baby would be an additional burden to us financially. I found myself not only praying for the participants and the service team but also for myself.

The Lord reminded us of other couples that we know who have gone to great lengths to have a child, while others have resorted to adoption just to fulfill a lifelong dream to have a baby. The Lord let us realize that we had been chosen to bring into this world another Christian and that it was a special privilege to raise another child in His likeness. He focused our attention on our four children and on how He has carefully provided for them with good health, good education and given us the means to raise them with relatively comfortable lives.



Our apprehension about Dessa's pregnancy and everything else associated with it vanished as we felt God's assurance and love. We felt that we ourselves had become "participants" in the on-going BCLP; we had ceased to become "exempted" from God's reach just because we were merely serving. We weren't just onlookers but actual recipients of His powerful grace.

Dessa: The orientation and 1st session of the BCLP fell on my birthday. Little did I know that the Lord had a big "birthday gift" in store for me as it was at about this time that I must have conceived our baby. My last pregnancy had been 8 years ago and it was hard to believe that I was "on the way" again.

The next few weeks were marked by severe headaches and nausea spells. I prayed that I would be okay on Saturdays for the BCLP and true enough, the Holy Spirit would empower me with the strength to listen to the talks, assist in the activities and join the prayer warriors. I was even able to continue attending to my patients on Saturdays, which were heavy clinic days for us, despite my discomfort.

Oca: We cannot help but look back at BCLP 7 and the numerous messages that the Lord had given us as we served as head couple. Despite the initial apparent lack of resources, low number of participants and organizational lapses, as we continually turned to Him for discernment and guidance, things began to run more smoothly as the BCLP progressed. Pledges of financial support came in, attendance improved and we felt the growing bond among participants and their discussion leaders as their spiritual growth became more palpable.

Dessa: I could not help but admire the Lord's wondrous ways. It seemed like the Lord was working in the participants' lives at such a pace and depth that was surprising to say the least. Imagine a participant praying in tongues even before the Baptism in the Holy Spirit! I cannot forget when during one of the sessions, I lost my wallet in the session hall. When I realized my loss the next day and went back for it, I was pleasantly surprised when one of the waiters returned it to me and I learned that he was a member of Couples for Christ!

Oca: Time and again, the Lord spoke to us through the concerns, problems, trials and victories of members of the service team as well as the participants. The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass held prior to each session proved to be another welcome avenue the Lord used for his messages. People were touched by the talks, the music, the group discussions, the warmth of brothers and sisters, and even through the books on the book table.

Dessa: The Lord made us feel how sweet it is to serve Him even though it meant sacrificing one's time, talent and treasure. I personally learned new perspectives from the talks as the speakers came well prepared, well-read and spiritually ready to deliver God's message. Even before the Baptism and Commitment sessions, the participants found that they were hooked on the Lord.

Oca: In retrospect, it seems that as course leaders, we learned more than what we offered to the participants. Truly the Lord touched Dessa and me through our responsibilities as His servants.

My pregnancy, though it came as a big surprise and in difficult times, definitely is a welcome blessing. We are eagerly awaiting the arrival of our fifth child, a son, by the end of March. After serving as an action group leader for more than a year, I noticed that instead of growing spiritually, I was beginning to feel the pressure of my responsibilities, both in being an action group leader (AGL) and in being a manager in FEBTC. I entered a period of "spiritual dryness". Since I did not want my members to be affected by this dryness, I asked our chapter head if we could take a leave for a while as an AGL.

But the Lord did not allow me to completely lose touch with the BCBP. He sent me in another direction that freed me from my spiritual

drought.

The right time came when the Lucena Outreach and the governance of Rizal chapter planned to hold a marriage retreat and Christian Life Program, respectively. My wife and I were asked to serve as a servant couple for the BCMR in Lucena. Then two days later we were invited to serve in BCLP 7 in our chapter. We readily accepted for I felt that this was where the Lord planned to overcome our spiritual drought.

Of course, no road is smooth and fair weather is not always seen. My faith was again tested when pressing personal problems tried to distract me from the BCLP. Actually it was serving in the BCLP that helped me so much. The sharings and teachings were timely and very related to what I was experiencing at that moment. All the ways that helped our speakers surpass their problems made me realize that my own problems too would be solved in God's own time. Even the homilies during the masses enlightened me. My spirit was rekindled, I overcame my obstacles and the bond between Him and me became stronger.

Like every other employee, I also was affected by the Asian regional crisis. Since our company's sales and collections were way too low — in fact, below our break-even mark — our salaries were delayed and cash advances were overstretched. To make matters worse, most of the students who were enrolled in my wife Yoly's tutoring services pulled out as their parents also had their own cost-cutting measures.

Despite these difficulties I took comfort in the Lord's eternal and inspiring words: "Ask and you shall receive, seek and you shall find, knock and the door will be opened to you."

In turn, these were the exact words which served as the invitation to my wife and me to serve as the assistant course leader couple in the Brotherhood Christian Life Program, BCLP #7 of the Rizal Chapter. We both enthusiastically accepted.

As the 13-week BCLP ran its course, I asked and I received, I sought and I found, I knocked and the Lord opened the door.

I was offered to be one of the resource persons to conduct PLDT's Touching Lives seminar, which in turn, allowed me to set myself free from the company I previously worked for. Similarly, I got feelers from the training group I was working with that the Gokongwei Brothers Foundation had put up a Technical Training Center. I didn't qualify for employment but my wife did.

Indeed the Lord works in mysterious ways.

On top of all that the Lord provided me with another job — I now work as a consultant-on-call at the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA).

But I wasn't the only one who benefited from the Lord's blessings. All the twenty-two participants in the BCLP did, too. Aside from being blessed with material things, good relationships were formed and a lot of other couples — from confused to non-practicing Catholics — found richer, more satisfying spiritual lives.

From experience I can now say with conviction that service is a consistent source of blessings. We should never let our feelings of unworthiness prevent us from sharing our Godgiven talents with our colleagues. Spirituality is simply defined as our personal relationship with the Lord characterized by a deep prayer life and a hunger for the Lord's word in Scripture. I believe the Lord's call for spirituality is not only for our leaders, but for all our members as well.

The trunk symbolizes our *community life*. A healthy tree has a robust body. In the same way, a healthy community has a healthy community life.

What do we mean by this? The basic characteristic of a strong community is *unity*. The body does not split into different directions. There are no factions, no competing groups. All are working for the same purpose and goal that the Lord Himself gives to the group. Relationships are harmonious. They may not be perfect, but members are seeking to be at peace with each other. They know how to ask for forgiveness and how to give forgiveness.

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Leaders care for their members and members love and respect their leaders. Just as in the story of the first Christian community narrated in Acts, the community grows in numbers very fast because


outsiders are attracted by the witness of the community members.

The upper tree — the leaves, the flowers and the fruits — symbolize our evangelistic results. Just as the leaves, flowers and fruits of a tree come from deep roots and a healthy trunk, the evangelistic harvest that we see can only come from deep spirituality and a healthy community life. Evangelization does not and cannot operate separately from these two important areas of our life as a body.

I am also very excited to share with you what I visualize at the end of my three years as a chapter head. First, I see a strong and healthy community growing in such great numbers that Rizal as a chapter will be ready to split into two. This will be a split brought about not by division but by grace.

I see Lucena Outreach becoming a chapter.

I see our chapter being very active in corporate evangelization, building prayer communities in companies operating in our area of responsibility.

Can all these happen? Too good to be true? To be sure, they will not happen because of the chapter head. Nor because we have great leaders. Nor because we have hardworking members. Let's not kid ourselves.

This is not our work. This is the Lord's work and we are only His servants. It is the Lord who will make these things happen. We just need to cooperate with the Lord in his great plan for our chapter. We look forward to seeing the tree that is Rizal not just grow in spirituality, a strong community life and evangelization but that it will become the beginning of a great forest of such trees. Will you say "Amen" to the Lord? I pray that you all do.

Cebu mission team invades Calbayog

Bishop Max Cruz had invited the BCBP Cebu chapter to introduce the BCBP to Calbayog City, the seat of his archdiocese. 

the usual dinstead as an extathat we a group Program

oday I deviate from the usual fare of this column and instead share with our readers an excerpt of a culture talk that we are to deliver before a group of participants in a Christian Life Program of the Brotherhood of Christian Businessmen and Professionals - San Fernando, an Outreach of the Greenhills Chapter.

The subject is about Speech and Wrongdoing. Due to space limitation, the piece has been abridged to the barest minimum.

When God created man, he saw to it that he (man) was superior in all aspects to all God's creatures. He gave him a rational mind so he could think and be creative. He gave him wisdom and knowledge so he could rule over all the other living creatures. God gifted man with discernment so he could distinguish between good and evil. And along with that he gave him the will to do as he pleases according to his perception of right and wrong.

He gave man the ability to express his thoughts in spoken words. This is what we call speech.

thoughts, ideas, feelings, and emotions. We can transmit expressions of love, trust, compassion, anger, hatred, envy, jealousy, distrust, etc.

Speech can be a tool for good or bad. While it cannot move mountains, it can move people to do what is bidded of them. It can be a force for good or for evil. Hitler, for example used his extraordinary ability to speak to rally the German people into conquering Europe and other parts of the world which resulted in the death of millions.

As individuals our words translate thoughts of our hearts into patterns of behavior that harden into habits - either for good or for bad, like joy and faith, or depression or discouragement.

According to the Scriptures, speech can either bring death or life. As Matthew

of serious sins like the refusal to worship God and violation of personal relationship. In 2 Thessalonians 3:11, it says: "We say this because we hear that there are some people among you who live lazy lives and who do nothing except meddle in other people's business."

And now we come to the kind of speech that brings life. What are these forms of speech that we must practice in our everyday life because they bring us closer to God and to our fellowmen?

First, we have the gracious speech - that which imparts grace- God's grace and our own. It provides words of affection, concern. They are constructive and full of substance. Thus, in Colossians 4:6, it says: "Your speech should always be pleasant and interesting, and you should know how to give the right answer to everyone."

Gracious speech strengthens personal relationships within a group and brings the members closer to God and the community.

Then there's glorious speech. Glorious speech is what elevates our relationship with God. For just as our speech can build up and strengthen human relationship, it can also build a healthy relationship with the Lord.

Indeed, speech can be a powerful force - for good or for evil. And as God and the Scriptures teach us, let us follow the right path to a wholesome, friendly and pleasant relationship with people by using the speech that brings life - the gracious and glorious way of communicating with God and humankind.

As individuals our words translate the thoughts of our hearts into patterns of behavior that harden into habits - either for good or for bad, like joy and faith, or depression or discouragement.

Speech, thus, is God's gift to man to differentiate him from animals. For animals and other creatures, like the birds and insects, can produce sounds but they never speak. By the sounds they produce they may understand each other. But that ability in no way can be called speech. Because speech is spoken words that make people communicate with and understand each other.

Through this faculty of oral communication, we are able to express our 12:37 states: "By your words you will be justified and by your words you will be condemned." Cursing, reviling, guile, acting as a false witness and slander are forms of verbal aggression that in a manner of speaking bring death. As Exodus 21:17 says: "Whoever curses his father or his mother is to be put to death."

Gossip is likewise a condemnable act, according to the Scripture. While it is generally considered a petty sin, the scripture classifies gossip in the same category



uppose that while I am giving a teaching before a large audience, someone slips me a note saying that the car of one of the members of the audience is on fire. Suppose that I read the note, but then I choose not to make the announcement because, let's say, I don't want to give cause for that car owner to be anxious or upset. And then suppose that at the end of my talk, that car owner comes to me and says, "Eddie, I feel terrible, I went out to the parking area and saw that my car had just burned down." Then I will say, "I know. You know that note that someone slipped to me while I was giving a talk? Well, it said that your car was on fire." "Why didn't you tell me?" the other guy would say. And my simple reply, "I didn't want to tell you because I didn't want you to feel bad."

Ridiculous. But we see it being done every day. "Huwag mo na lang sabihin, baka siya masaktan." "Baka siya ma turn off, baka hindi niya ako maintindihan, baka magalit pa siya."

Some people are afraid of the truth. They are afraid of hurting others or losing their love. They don't realize that truth, spoken in love, is the only way to show real love. Edwin Cole, author of the book entitled Maximized Manhood calls this best affections.

In the office, sometimes we can be so solicitous and careful not to let anything happen without approval of our friends and associates that we destroy our work atmosphere by means of best affections. For a long time, I was going around my office without hearing the Word of God because my coworkers didn't want to make me feel bad, or cause me to be upset, by confronting me about my sins and wrongdoing. All my co-workers, that is except one, a true friend, God's messenger.

Okay, maybe we do not want to sound self righteous, nor do we want to be judgmental. But brothers, there's a war out there, and there are people who are victims of evil without them realizing it. And we, who are in Christ, we know that people need the Lord. We know the strategies of the evil one. We know the truth about Jesus, and the lies that the evil one has planted in the minds of us all. And we know that Jesus can set them free.

If we do not tell the truth to these people, we propagate the lies of the evil one. If we do not tell these people about the saving power of Jesus, who's going to tell our friends and coworkers that their car is on fire?

God has a reason for calling each one of us to Him. God has a reason for bringing us all into this community, this brotherhood of Christian businessmen and professionals. God desires that we become a lamp on a pedestal, shining forth His light in the darkness of the marketplace. He has given us the power of the Holy Spirit, a power that emboldens us and gives us the wisdom to proclaim the good news about Jesus. That is why He has put us in a place of influence at work, where we are in contact with colleagues, customers or suppliers. He keeps sending us people who need Him, and yet who have not discovered where and who He is.

If, until now, you feel that you do not have that power nor that wisdom, but you want to obey Jesus, and you want to have the kind of love that speaks the truth, then call upon Jesus today and ask Him for this Holy Spirit. Ask Him to reveal to you the truth about loving God and loving your neighbors, the truth that sets you and all those who work with you free.

And in this coming season of Lent, let us repent for the many times when we have chosen not to bring Jesus into the lives of those whom we supposedly love and care for. Let us repent for those times when we have chosen not to bring the comfort of Jesus to people whom He has sent for us to call, when we have been shy to proclaim our faith because we are afraid of hurting others or of being rejected.

In Ephesians 1:18-19, Paul says, "May (the God of our Lord Jesus Christ) enlighten your innermost vision that you may know the great hope to which he has called you, the wealth of his glorious heritage to be distributed among the members of the church, and the immeasurable scope of his power in us who

believe."

n the last five years that I have been working full time for the BCBP I have seen how it has grown. At the beginning of my term, there were around half the number of chapters and outreaches that there are today.

Every time one of these nefarious practices crumbles to the ground, it adds to the heap that bridges us closer to heaven. This is QUALITY growth.

Fortunately one of our foundational programs is directed towards fighting these so-called institutional evils. The Brotherhood's Christians in Business Retreat (BCBR) is one such program that deals exactly with how we should behave when we are confronted by these evils. Talk after talk, the course progresses toward the realization of exactly why we are all here in the BCBP — to win the marketplace for Christ.

In the last couple of BCBRs where I participated, there were several questions and concerns that dealt with these wrong practices. I could read between the lines that the ones asking these questions themselves are either partly or directly involved in the situation. At first I felt sad to think that these BCBPers are still at it despite having gone through the conversion process, after having attended breakfasts and completing the 13-week BCLP, finishing all the teaching tracks plus the BCMR.

However contemplating deeper brought me to the realization that it meant the other way around. It meant that these BCBPers are outrightly confronting the issues and they are craving for the much needed confirmation or advice. They are right there in the front of the fray, arming themselves for

It is equally important that we, ourselves, are fit for the fight. We should never lose our focus that in the end, this wilderness marketplace full of sins shall crumble to add to the pile that will bridge us closer to heaven. Only then can we say we have won "a" marketplace for Christ, and that truly we have grown.

hen you put a boy and a girl like this," Tono gently slapped his palms together, "what happens?" My then four-year-old was staring at me, a little too boldly, I thought, as if he knew the answer and was daring me to declare it.

I swear I broke out in cold sweat. Here it was: The Question! Luckily, I was too stunned to blurt out the reply that occurred to me. Instead, I took a deep, very deep breath and asked, "What do you mean?"


And the little boy replied, "I mean, di ba, the boy should be taller?" He was talking about HEIGHTS, for goodness' sake! Having a little sister, he thought all girls were smaller...so we talked about bigger and smaller, and older and younger...much to my relief. It was NOT yet time.

Eventually though, the questions did come, and they're still coming. Kids being kids, they range from the hilarious: "Right, Mom, Dad has five sperms, and they're all used up?" to the dead serious: "When I become a Mommy, will there be a lot of blood?" I have had to grapple with quite a lot, in terms of controlling panic, thinking at lightning speed and maintaining my poise in public.

I have discovered that no matter the phraseology, these questions and comments are quite earnest, requiring forthright and truthful responses. I can't just toss out a careless, dismissive remark and expect the child to be satisfied with that. On the contrary, it would be quite insulting and even dangerous — what if, unsatisfied with my reply, he refers the matter to his seatmate, or the family driver? If my child respects me enough to bring his question to me, I must return that respect through a straight and sincere reply. As much as I can manage, anyway. Equilibrium can fly out the window when confronted with "Where, exactly, Mom, is the cervix, show me!" while riding in the van with ALL my in-laws! Respecting my son as much as I do, he had to be content with "It's near the uterus, Nico, I'll show you when we have the book."

Yes, the book. Informative, it has illustrations, charts, arrows and all, allowing me to speak volumes, pardon the pun. Objective, it has the right words delivered in perfect balance, without resorting to useless gestures in the air and countless "you know's". With a guided walk through appropriate text, I can address my children's queries with factual, unbiased information. I must stress that "guided" and "appropriate" are the operative words here. It wouldn't do to just let a child loose with a book on sex education. A responsible adult must always be on hand to regulate the intake and clarify its perception. Similarly, my little Mia going over a book intended for a 3rd grader will be too much too soon, with consequences that may be difficult to repair.

Helpful as books are, there's nothing like a face-to-face talk. Sex is an important subject, and must not be left to reading or



even teacher's instructions. A little subjectivity will not hurt. In fact, with some involvement in replying to our children's questions on sex, I am able to impart our values — Christian values — to them.

I often use the terms "husband" and "wife" in my explanations, or Daddy and Mommy, referring to Nelson and myself. These put sex within the context of marriage. I often also allude to matters of faith: creation, God's greatness, morality and responsibility. When Marga once inquired, "When I'm a Mommy, how many kids will I have?", saying "I don't know" seemed candid and honest enough. But her question offered a little opportunity to teach, and so I said "That will depend on you, your future husband, and God." In one answer, I managed to link parenthood with marriage and put God into the picture. To her inevitable segue, "Why?", I then replied with my main message, "Because God is a part of all families, and He's in charge of building them, too." As in anything else, talking about the birds and the bees should always point to their Creator.

Pointing towards the profound doesn't always do the trick, though. We were once watching a tape of <u>Independence Day</u> and one scene depicted an air force captain marrying his girlfriend, with their young son as ring bearer. My sons were at me in two seconds flat:

Q: "Are they getting married again, because it's their anniversary or something?"

A: "No, only now. They wanted to do it before he goes on his mission to save the world."

Q: "How did they have a son if they didn't get married before?"

A: "Some people do that — it's a sin, and these two decided they want to fix it and make it right."

Q (ignoring my reply): "How did that happen, Mom?"

"Jesus said to him, 'Judas, would you betray the Son of Man with a kiss?" Luke 22:48

Judas was one of the twelve chosen apostles, the one who treacherously betrayed Jesus. The event took place on the night before Jesus was to be crucified. This eventful day is remembered by the Christian faithful on Good Friday. This day would be an excellent time to reflect on how God temporarily gave up his throne to become man, and in the redemptive process allowed himself to be arrested, tried, condemned to die, and finally, crucified. Finally, clarify before you reply. As my very first example illustrates, "What do you mean?" is a gem of a response. Faced with it, the child now needs to explain his question, giving

his thankful parent the parameters within which to compose an answer, not to mention precious time to think! Whether intended or not, children's questions are often very tricky. To assume things is conversational suicide. A quick launch into a lecture can have one end up with the proverbial foot in one's mouth. We all heard about the hapless parent who sweated out the reproductive functions of the human species when all his kid wanted to know was if they came from Cebu or Bacolod.

So the next time your grade schooler walks up to you and challenges you with something from his latest Sex Ed class, smile, take a deep breath, look him in the eye and sweetly ask, "Why do you want to know?"

We begin this Year of God the Father by sharing with you Cardinal Jaime Sin's Message delivered on January 23, 1999 at PICC during the Festival of Conferences on God the Father.

1999, the last year in the triennium, marked out for the immediate preparation for the great Jubilee Year 2000, has been dedicated to God the Father. We are thus asked to reflect prayerfully on the reality of God as he has been revealed to us by Jesus, as well as to renew our filial relationship with God as the Father of Jesus — as a loving Father. The Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines (CBCP) has invited us to make this year also a time for bringing nearer to realization the Church of the Poor in our country because the Father is truly and in a special way "the Father of the poor."

It is with these two poles of reflection and deed that we entered upon our National Conference on God the Father, a "festival in honor of Our Father in Heaven." Father of Jesus...Father of the Church of the Poor.

FATHER OF JESUS. The very core of what Jesus came to reveal to us is that God is our Father, that God is not someone who looks upon ourselves and the world which he created "from a distance", but who is ever turned toward

us, his sons and daughters by creation and the life of grace, in caring and concern, in compassion and love.

The God whom Jesus revealed to us was a God whose very nature was to be utterly and unconditionally "for us", a God "on our side" always, a Father so incredibly loving and forgiving, we could not have imagined him by ourselves.

OUR FATHER, TOO. As it was for Jesus, so it must be for us. Jesus came not only to wash away our sins; he came to share his sonship with us, in the measure we can make it ours, he came to make us adopted daughters and sons of his Father, so that we too might know and love the Father, sons and daughters in him and through him, so that in the Spirit we can ourselves cry out, "Abba, Father!"

All this Jesus summed up for us in his prayer, the Lord's Prayer, where in a true sense Jesus gives us the compendium of guidelines for our lives as sons and daughters of his Father. Everything in us must be a constant turning to the Father; everything in us must be grasped and directed by the dream of bringing the Kingdom of the Father into our real world; a kingdom of truth and justice, of freedom and solidarity, of love and peace, a kingdom where everyone around us is brother and sister; sharer, companion and



friend. For this is the dream of the Father, and this is his will: that what Jesus saw in his Abba-experience, that vision which he shares with us, should be translated wholly in terms of life within our world and our history. This "translation" he spelled out in his beatitudes: sharing and solidarity, in bread and all of life's needs; lowliness of heart and unending compassion for victims and the poor; relation-

How to prepare for the millenium

ass it on to your friends and parents. These are things we can do to prepare for the coming of the year 2000.

When the year 2000 arrives (Jan. 01, 2000), there may be computer failures that may affect some of the things we manage daily. Not a serious problem since most of the utility companies are already upgrading their system for Y2K compliance. But there is a suggested preparation list:

1) Fill your car(s) with gasoline just before Dec. 31, 1999. This is because electricity might fail, thus gas pumps may not be working starting Jan. 01, 2000.

I will fear no bugs, for you are my backup; Your password protects me;


You prepare the menu before me in the presence of my enemies;

- 2) Have 2 weeks of cash on hand. Automated teller machines and banks may have problems. Having cash on hand will help see you through the transition. Be sure to get cash before Dec. 31, 1999.
 - 3) Have 2 weeks of the following on hand:
 - non-perishable food, water
 - prescription medicine
 - candles
 - batteries
 - flashlights
- 4) Be cautious about flying or riding a train on Jan. 01, 2000. Flight and train controllers may experience outages. Road gates for trains may not work.
- 5) Obtain a copy of your credit report before Sept. 09, 1999. Get another one after Sept. 09,1999 (but before Dec. 31, 1999). Then get a credit report after Jan. 01, 2000. Compare these documents for errors - Sept. 9, 1999 is a problem date (9/9/99) because some sloppy programmers use a 9999 code as a reset flag.
- 6) Obtain paper copies of bank, investment and credit card account status.

t was over lunch just a few days before Christmas when we were blessed with precious time together amidst the holiday rush. A generous aunt just got us a new computer with all the works, except for the modem which I chose to forego. My brother Jimmy (who's also with the BCBP) was convincing us to get one and hook up on the Internet, citing all the benefits that would outweigh the cost.

Honestly I fear getting stuck on the Internet and wasting precious time surfing and chatting. I've heard startling stories about mothers forgetting to feed or give medication to their children because they lose track of time surfing. Or of couples endlessly at odds with each other because of time put into surfing rather than attending to more important matters. I'm scared, too, that my kids might just get hold of the supposedly "Ruffa and Donita shots", or of me losing precious sleep when chats get too interesting and you just can't quit!

On the other hand, I've also heard of wonderful stories about the benefits of the Internet. Readers Digest featured an article about someone with a mysterious disease in China getting cured because two US doctors picked up his friend's appeal on the Web. There are stories, too, of longtime missing persons being located, or of homeless children being adopted into caring families because of the Internet.

I almost fell off my chair when Jimmy said that the best thing he likes about the Internet is the CHAT. Among my three brothers, I consider him to be the most level-headed and spiritually mature, so what's really great about wasting time chatting with somebody in Germany or Australia?!!! I've had the benefit of surfing the Net at "friend's price" since some of my closest childhood friends set up an Internet cafe two years ago, and I've experienced how some chats could get so obscene or confrontational. What does he, a zealous servant in the community, like about these things? Without batting an eyelash, he shared with us the beautiful experience of evangelizing people anywhere through the Internet. He chats with a number of nationalities, people of varied religious affiliations, and some atheists, too, revealing to them the blessings of living a total life in Christ. Some respond, some just shut off. Others ask if he is a priest, some even ridicule.

Through his chats, Jimmy has discovered certain areas that need to be considered and dealt with in the teachings of our BCBP culture. Some people you chat with tend to be confrontational or impertinent. We as evangelizers are then exposed to the possibility of getting confrontational, too in our effort to defend our faith and our God. The most important thing, he says, is to maintain a character of genuine love and understanding towards the person you chat with, no matter what they say.

One of Jimmy's most fruitful chats was with someone from far across the globe, someone who called himself Lucifer on the web, with Satan/666 as an e-mail address. When asked why he uses such names, he answered in a matter-of-fact manner, "Because I am." As the chat progressed, Jimmy asked him if he was willing to go through an exercise. He was asked to close his eyes and explain what he sees. Nothing, he says. Next he was to look around him and see everything, then asked where he thinks all these came from. With not much thought, the guy replied that all he sees around him was created through the alignment of energies. He seemed such a smart fellow. Jimmy then led him to think along the line of energy coming from the littlest of atoms and molecules which someone must have created. 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
