just listened to the proceedings of the Senate hearing where Chairman Neri said under oath that Comelec Chairman Abalos offered him a bribe to push the ZTE contract. Among the words that kept flying about were "bribery", "perjury", "truth", "blame", "privilege", "your honor" and even "double-cross". At some point during the questioning, Senator Joker Arroyo said that it was probably impossible to determine the truth as Chairman Abalos, Mr. Joey De Venecia and Chairman Neri each denied the accusations of the others.

Is the truth important? Of what value is it for us businessmen and professionals?

In this country, businessmen and politicians get called to congressional

hearings when they are caught in high profile cases and they are subjected to grilling and the grandstanding of lawmakers—at least, until the next more juicy scandal. Then, the perpetrators quietly slide back into "business as usual".

For many of us, this is no longer surprising. Our sensibilities have become so jaded that we simply shrug our shoulders and turn to the sports page. As a result, the values of this world like living for self and for the moment become the accepted norm.

But BCBP members, being agents of change in the marketplace, being deputies of the Lord's office, being champions of Jesus' values, have to do something about this situation.



We in the Mancom and the Board of Trustees recognize this. We also recognize that our members need more to be able to do more. Here, I refer to the need for intensive, committed and guided formation so that our members eventually become the Lord's effective change agents in the business milieu.

In order to achieve this, we have decided to remodel the basic formation program



that all members go through. It will now start right after the Baptism in the Holy Spirit during the BCLP and continue for about 13 months thereafter.

This New Basic Formation Program (NBFP) was piloted in Cebu and Alabang. As a result of these pilots, we have made some changes and further improved the contents, the sequence and the pacing. We believe that we now have a first-rate formation program that should help our members become truly committed in their service to the Lord in the marketplace.

In addition, we are also launching a reformatted Action Group Leaders' Training (AGLT) which is intended to coach, sharpen and strengthen the members who have potential for this crucial service.

We believe that the best people to conduct the different courses in these essential programs are those who have not just the skills but also the heart for formation and who have been in the Brotherhood for some time. If they have been in leadership positions, they would be even more appropriate as that means they would have already gone through the different modules themselves.

In our different chapters, we have valuable resources in the persons of brothers who have served their terms as Chapter Heads and in other more senior service and who are therefore classified as Senior Members in the BCBP. We have asked them to help in the conduct of these two basic courses so that they can share their wealth of wisdom with the members as well as with the chapter governance. We will be sending them through a Senior Leaders' Training (SLT) to prepare them to conduct the NBFP and the AGLT. We will also prepare them to be coaches to the chapters so that our activities will remain in accordance with the vision and mission of the BCBP.

We in the Mancom and the BOT know that we need to keep continuous improvement on the front burner because we have to plan for tomorrow's challenges and opportunities. We, therefore hope that with these developments, we will be able to better preserve the vision, the mission and the core values of our community.

Pray with us, brothers and sisters, for the success of these initiatives.

Through the Eyes of Jesus

henever I have a chance to give a talk for a BCLP, I make it a point to prepare well so that the subject matter assigned is clear in my own heart. Of interest to me is to be able to have eye contact with as many participants as I can in order to be an effective witness for the Lord, to be able to say things with conviction straight to each heart listening. I also look around with interest at the participants wondering in my mind who among these will actually love the Lord and his Word as a pearl of great price. This makes all speaking opportunities for me an exciting evangelistic event.

Over the years it has been a sad

reality to recall people who were once in the roll of BCBP chapters but have since moved out for a variety of reasons. Although admittedly not all of those reasons are sad, I am particularly concerned about those who despite all efforts did not get the message of Good News or once held it but let go of it.

Every year, many times a year and in many places the BCBP community launches the Brotherhood Christian Life Program for the eternal benefit of the people of the marketplace. Precious resources are put together to invite participants and servants in order that Christ's initiative will come into the flesh and result in the Lord's joy — additions into his army of disciples.



And yet as you go through each BCLP roster as far back as you can you will see only a handful left for each valiant effort exerted by the community. Is it really a sad state of affairs? I subscribe to what our Bro. Larry Larrazabal says in every talk he



gives, "All BCLP's are successful. So, you may say if they are really successful, then why only a few remain from each year? Because I believe that all these resources and valiant efforts were really meant for these few. 'Many are called but few are chosen'." Recall also the parable of the Sower — where there a few seeds fell on good soil, and others were choked by worldly concerns.

THIS IS the reality of all evangelistic efforts. For me this shows the greatness of God's love for all. He spreads his message to all; however, each individual is responsible for his or her response to God's great love.

Remember when Jesus healed 10 lepers but only one came back to pay him homage and give thanks? Or the good shepherd who would leave his ninety-nine sheep in search of the lost one? Or even the parable of the Prodigal son. Why? Because we are a different kind of sheep, because those who know they were lost realize the most WHAT THEY HAVE GAINED.

You will find the list incredible and impressive, those who fall in this category. St. Peter, who denied Jesus 3 times, St. Paul, a persecutor of Christians, two hated, dishonest tax collectors, Matthew and Zaccaheus, Mary Magdalene, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Augustine, King David, a murderer and adulterer — the list could go on and on. Jesus truly came

into this world for sinners, to heal it and redeem it.
Jesus came for the sick and the lost so we can all be saved.

I also believe precisely this is the reason why discipleship is not for the weak and fainthearted. Jesus calls us to

the Cross in order to purify us for heaven. Those of us who cannot bear their cross for their own transformation are not worthy of heaven and Jesus. I also recall when Jesus was addressing the rich young man who already followed all of the commandments and statutes. As a test Jesus tells him to sell all his possessions and give them to the poor. This eventually revealed what was his perspective — and sadly it was an earthly one. Jesus wants us to confront this perspective because his kingdom is not of this earth.

There is a tendency to handle with kid gloves those called to conversion, commitment and commissioning. All of which if read with the "natural mind" described in 1 Cor. 2:14-16 will result in a weak discipleship, one that will dwindle in the face of trials and temptations. What we need is to put on the mind of Christ which molds us with a heavenly perspective rather than a worldly, materialistic one. This is why our Church celebrates its martyrs, because it is surely their heavenly perspective that allowed them to bear horrible tortures and death for the sake of the Gospel, not because they were masochists.

As we ponder and look at our roster of members let us always remember to put on the mind of Christ, that we may see with the eyes of Christ, his true disciples ready to bear his Cross in order gain eternal life with him.

The Greatest is Love

"Now we have faith, hope and love, these three, but the greatest of these is love."

1 Cor 13:13

Il Christians accept these three theological virtues. Faith implies, in the Christian context, trust, loyalty, and an unswerving belief in the One True God. Catholics, in particular, profess their beliefs in the Apostles' Creed.

Hope is a reliance and expectation in God's enduring love coming to our aid when situations look dim. When it is darkest, we try to grab and hold on to anything, hoping beyond hope that help will be provided. Hope, unless anchored on faith, can evaporate and, like smoke, dissipate in the wind.

Of the three, love is the greatest. Love, as some would categorize it, is spelled out into agape love, which expresses divine love; philia love, as the highest quality of natural or platonic love; sporge, a love limited to the concept of family love; the last is eros, a love that predominantly has a sensual element, affected by sexual desire.

St. Paul, in 1 Cor. 13:4-7, defines love as surpassing all other human considerations – "Love is patient, kind, without envy. It is not boastful or arrogant. It is not ill-mannered nor does it seek its own interest. Love overcomes anger and forgets offenses. It does not take delight in wrong, but rejoices in truth. Love excuses everything, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."

If we have everything we desire – money, power, influence – but have no love, we are nothing!

Dear Jesus, I know I will be tested, appraised, and finally judged by how I have loved. Grant me the wisdom to love, regardless of the consequences. Amen.

or many years, our marble export business enjoyed a profitable cooperation with the Philippine Trade Training Center (PTTC). Whenever they received inquiries from overseas for products that we carried, we were among the companies they recommended. This resulted in a number of good contracts for us, and a healthy commission for PTTC.

We considered this association a real gift from the Lord. We never applied with the PTTC for them to promote us. We never even sought them out. One day, we just received a call from the blue, requesting for a meeting with a client they were referring, mediated by one of their lady representatives. She was dedicated, sincere, very professional, and she made our business with PTTC extremely pleasurable.

Thus, when she announced her retirement, we projected that there would be changes, not only in the frequency of our encounters but also in the quality of the business we conducted with PTTC. We were right, but we did not anticipate exactly how these changes would be.

One day, we were called upon by two young gentlemen who introduced themselves as those who would look after the work our former lady representative from PTTC had vacated. Nelson was in another meeting and so I met with them alone. After introductions and small talk, we discussed the pending accounts we had with PTTC and some interesting prospects. I was just concluding to myself that the meeting was going well when suddenly, one of the young gentlemen asked me, "So, what about the "for-the-boys?""

I did a double take. I was not sure I heard him right and I asked him to repeat himself, which he did. Buying time, I asked him to please explain what he meant, and, without batting an eyelash, he did. Indeed, he was asking how we intended to provide a bribe for him and his companion, for the maintenance of our business and the development of new accounts. I explained

that there was a commission being provided for PTTC in all our contracts. Quite brazenly, he clarified, "That's for PTTC. This is for us."

I took a very long, very deep breath. And in that moment, I lifted up the situation to the Lord. "This is not right, Lord," I whispered in my heart, "give me the strength, Lord, give me the words."

I was starting to shake, and a cold sweat was beginning. As calmly as I could, I told our visitors, "We don't do that." One of them replied, "That would be unfortunate,

because then we will probably favor other exporters."

I was angry now. "We don't do that," I repeated. It was the best I could manage. "We are renewed Catholics, we don't do that." And then, I couldn't resist adding "I will probably inform your boss." In a very quick hurry, they left.

Well, we

never – NEVER – heard from them again. And because they were in charge of our business, we never had new prospects through PTTC again. In fact, the accounts we were servicing died quiet deaths shortly after that meeting. I didn't tell their boss, as I hinted I might do. We decided to put the whole thing behind us.

To his credit, Nelson affirmed my decision, and we consoled ourselves with

the knowledge that it was the right thing to do. Lost business was part of the price we had to pay in order to be good followers of Christ. In the light of our many years in the BCBP, in the light of how God had been working in our lives, it was a fair exchange.



Back To Basics

The Moral Aspects of Road Use and

This Back To Basics article is based on the Document of the Pontifical Council for the Pastoral Care of Migrants and Itinerant People: "Guidelines for the Pastoral Care of the Road", Vatican City, June 19, 2007. oving from place to place and transporting goods using different means have characterized human behavior since the beginning of history. Today. our lives are conditioned by the car, as mobility has become an idol, which the car symbolizes.

However as Christians we must realize that roads and railways should be at the service of the human person, as tools for facilitating life and the integral development of society. They should constitute a communication bridge between peoples, thereby creating new economic and human spaces.


It is sad, however, that as the transportation of people and goods increases at a dizzy pace, road conditions and driver psychology often pose hazards. even putting life at risk. In addition to traffic congestion and road rage, we are directly exposed to dangers deriving from

other related problems, such as uneven roads and potholes, noise, air pollution, and intensive use of raw materials.

Road statistics are alarming. During the 20th century approximately 35 million people lost their lives in road accidents, while around one

and a half billion were injured. In the year 2000 alone, deaths amounted to 1,260,000, with around 90% of these accidents due to human error. Pope Paul VI in one of his talks said: "Too much blood is spilt every day in an absurd competition with speed and time. Whilst

> international organizations willingly devote themselves to reconciling painful rivalries, magnificent progress is being made in conquering space and adequate means are being sought to tackle the scourges of hunger, ignorance and disease, it is distressing to think that all over the world countless lives continue to be sacrificed every year to this unjustifiable fate."



THE PSYCHOLOGY OF **DRIVERS**

There is a particular phenomenon that happens when someone gets behind the wheel of a vehicle. He/she begins to

feel powerful, to have the urge to dominate and prove his/her superiority over those lesser people who have to walk. When driving a car some people start up the engine to join a race, in order to escape from the troubling pace of everyday life. Cars tend to bring out the

"primitive" side of human beings producing unbalanced behavior such as impoliteness, rude gestures, cursing, blasphemy, loss of sense of responsibility, an incapacity for self-control, and deliberate violation of the Highway Code and road laws.

One psychological factor that influences drivers' behavior is the domination instinct, or the feeling of arrogance, that impels the driver to use the power of the machine to assert his dominance over everything and every person perceived to be in his way. Another is the use of cars to fulfill the driver's vanity and for his/her personal glorification.

MORAL ASPECTS OF DRIVING

Driving means coexisting, entering into relations with others, whether the others are passengers, bystanders, or pedestrians. This capacity for coexistence presupposes certain specific qualities in a driver: namely, self-mastery, prudence, courtesy, a fitting spirit of service to those in need (who may need a ride, who may require assistance after an accident, etc.), and knowledge of road rules and laws.

Driving means being in control of oneself, not being prone to giving in to vengeful impulses when another driver suddenly swerves in front of you or brakes suddenly. Having a license to drive also presupposes that the driver knows how to maintain the vehicle in top condition and how to do on-the-spot trouble shooting or change a tire when necessary.

Driving means responsibility for oneself and others. One should never drive under the influence of alcohol and other stimulants, or drugs, or in a state of exhaustion or somnolence. One should not drive using an expired license or using someone else's license. Responsibility on the road means observing the speed limits, traffic signs, and directional signals, regardless of the time of day or night, regardless of whether anyone is watching or not, regardless of one's emotional state of mind

OUR MORAL RESPONSIBILITY AS ROAD USERS

The moral responsibility of road users, both drivers and pedestrians, derives from the obligation to respect the Fifth and Seventh

DRIVERS' TEN COMMANDMENTS

- I. You shall not kill.
- The road shall be for you a means of communion between people and not of mortal harm.
- III. Courtesy, uprightness and prudence will help you deal with unforeseen events.
- IV. Be charitable and help your neighbor in need, especially victims of accidents.
- V. Cars shall not be for you an expression of power and domination, and an occasion of sin.
- VI. Charitably convince the young and not so young not to drive when they are not in a fitting condition to do so.
- VII. Support the families of accident victims.
- VIII. Bring guilty motorists and their victims together, at the appropriate time, so that they can undergo the liberating experience of forgiveness.
- IX. On the road, protect the more vulnerable party.
- X. Feel responsible towards others.

Commandments: "Thou shalt not kill" and "Thou shalt not steal". Careless absent-mindedness and negligence are acts that violate these commandments. This means that, beyond the prohibition of directly killing, wounding or maiming, the Lord's commandment forbids any act that might bring about such harm indirectly. The same goes for any damage caused to one's neighbor's goods. Moral law also prohibits exposing anyone to grave danger, without serious grounds, as well as refusing assistance to a person in danger.

The Christian driver exercises the virtues of charity, prudence, justice, and hope. Charity means respecting and serving one's neighbor by making sure one's own vehicle is safe to use and that one does not endanger others while driving. Prudence calls for a suitable margin of caution when driving to see that one's attention is not distracted from the road by mobile phone or television or radio or loud conversation among passengers or a disturbance along the roadside.

Justice requires that drivers have a full and precise knowledge of the rules and regulations for road use and the intentions of their proper observance. Justice also dictates that road users should provide reparations for any damage caused to others, to forgive their "aggressors", and to respect the rights of all persons involved in a road/traffic dispute.

The Church's mission, as well as our task as members of the BCBP Christian community, is to go beyond condemnation and seek to raise overall public awareness regarding road safety and to promote corresponding and appropriate education of drivers, other travelers and pedestrians ... beginning with ourselves. The Gospel message of love applied to the road issue should be spread in our community and within society, thereby strengthening awareness of our moral obligations as travelers, as well as fostering a sense of Christian responsibility in order to ensure compliance with road rules and laws, thus avoiding offences and damages to third parties.

In addition to the Drivers' Ten
Commandments a BCBP driver should practice
the Golden Rule at all times: Do unto others as
you would have them do unto you. Or as it is
expressed another way: Do not do unto others
what you do not want them to do to you.

Every time we put an amount into this "Alay Kay Nanay Bottle", we contribute to the restoration of that much needed HOPE.



My P20 Offering

t was the first Friday of the month and the BCBP Bantayan Outreach of Cebu North Chapter had scheduled a mass at 5:00pm. I had only one twenty-peso bill in my pocket that I had decided to offer at mass. This was the period in my life that my finances were experiencing a hand-to-mouth situation. Several months before, I had resigned from my comfortable paying job to enjoy the warm family environment that I had missed due to my workaholic state. It was during this rest and physical reinvigoration time that I had begun to feel the hardest reality I had ever experienced in my whole life ... debts had piled up, there

were notices of electrical power disconnections, bills of collection flooded the mail ... and now I had only P20 in my pocket, wondering whether we would have enough food at home for supper.

My son approached me and asked me for ten pesos for his school project. I told him, "Son, all I have is this twenty-peso bill that I intend to offer to the Lord today, but if you really need it, have it changed, and I will just give ten pesos." A few moments later my son approached me and said, "Pa, give it all for the Lord." Then he whispered, "Pa, how about our viands this evening." It was the hardest inquiry I ever had to face, but I told him, "God will provide." He stared at me a little bit confused as if to say 'are you sure?' Then he walked away whispering to himself, "God will provide, God will provide."

Despite recurring doubts as to whether I was doing the right thing, and the possible family quarrels that could ignite so easily when money is lacking for basic necessities, I fell in line with the other brothers and sisters in the BCBP to give my love offering, all I had in my

pocket. I heard the parish priest utter the words, "Thank you, Brother Wings." It was God's way of thanking me for my sacrifice; I was the only name that the priest mentioned. It was a blessing for sustaining in times of trial and for passing the test.

I walked toward the front church door with a feeling I could not understand. Our Outreach Head, Bro. Dodong Villacastin asked me, "Bro. Wings, are you riding home with your motorcycle?" I answered, "No, I'll just walk" for how could I ride my motorcycle without any

gasoline. Bro. Dodong continued, "Would you mind

going with us to Bro.

replied but my mind was
troubled with what would be
for my family's supper.

Our table at the restaurant filled up with many different courses such as patatim, chopsuey, seafood mix, various other beef dishes. Bro. Peiping, the owner of the restaurant assured us that it was his treat because he wanted us to taste the specialties of his

restaurant. You know, it was hard for me to smile as I thought about the empty supper table at home.

Just then Bro. Peiping approached me and remarked, "Bro. Wings, I know it's more than enough, we could not consume all of these dishes. But please, don't leave anything, take all that is left home with you." Yes, he was serious. I went home that evening with the Lord's provisions for my family, that only cost me twenty pesos!

When I arrived home, my son approached me, surprised to see me with both hands full of

Eureka, I said to myself, the barrier has been breached! From that time on, whenever I had to get a message across, I would simply go to their room, kiss them goodnight and say: "I have a message for you and this is for your own good. You don't have to answer. You may or may not accept what I am saying. I just want

> you to listen." And I would proceed to deliver a monologue.

Eventually, I would note that my message got across by observing how the twins responded and their resulting behavior. I found that under certain circumstances, a oneway process of communication can be effective, if based on acceptable standards and norms of behavior, and more importantly, anchored on respect for feelings and

unconditional love.

Our Lord Jesus showed His total and unconditional love for us by His sacrifice on the cross. As good children, let us reciprocate by obeying His will.

Incidentally, I did not have a similar problem with my boys. They simply idolized their father. 📆

BCBP BREAKFAST GUIDELINES

INTRODUCTION:

Beyond the visible, the war for the souls of men and women, of our children, relatives, friends and colleagues rages on. Matthew 28:18 onwards calls us, as Christians, to take the armor of God, the Sword of the Spirit, in order for us to fight for the Lord, with the Lord, and with our brothers and sisters in this war. Technology has advanced so much in this world and in our workplaces that we tend to believe it has all the answers. We disagree. We believe that the world of technology, no matter how advanced it is, has no answer to an empty, unfulfilled life. The only answer is Jesus Christ. And this is the strategic importance of our Breakfast. It creates opportunities for men and women in business and professions to speak and hear about Jesus Christ through the sharings.


The BCBP's breakfast strategy for evangelizing our target market comes in a package. One important element is its

consistent Look and Feel where it is conducted. The synthesis outlined in this article consolidates all ideas and best practices recommended by Breakfast Heads and Mission Directors who attended the nationwide seminars held last year. This has passed the scrutiny and approval of the Mancom/BOT during its January 27, 2007, meeting. We seek the cooperation of all chapter/outreach governance and members in implementing the one Look and one Feel of the BCBP Breakfast. –Rene Cortes, NSC Mission

I. ADMINISTRATIVE

- a. The Mission Director, through the Breakfast Head, is responsible for the conduct of the breakfast and is accountable to the Chapter Head for its consistent execution within approved guidelines.
- The Chapter Head is responsible for ensuring that members of the Chapter





will regularly attend the breakfast and invite first timers. He appoints the Heads for both Men and Ladies Breakfasts from a short list given by the Mission Director.


- c. The Breakfast Head and his team are responsible for staging the breakfast regularly within approved guidelines. The Breakfast Head can form and appoint members to his/her team in consultation with AGLs.
- d. The Chapter Governance decides on matters of subsidy: free breakfasts to first timers, guests, and the breakfast team as long as it is affordable and within approved budgets.

II. ONE LOOK

a. <u>Banners</u>. The national Office will produce all breakfast banners to ensure consistency and uniformity in fonts, colors, size and logo. Official Banners in the breakfast venue will consist of the following: 1 Be Honest streamer (right side), 1 'Come Have Breakfast with Jesus' streamer (left side), 1 Welcome Streamer at the center and 1 rostrum banner. Another Welcome Streamer to

- be installed outside the venue to announce the breakfast will be included in the package.
- b. Altar. An altar is NOT necessary in a breakfast. If you opt to have an altar, it should consist of only an enthroned bible and must be placed at the side of the room, not on the stage, platform or in the front. It may be placed where you can pray-over the sharers and where the team can pray together before or after the breakfast. More importantly, it should be in a place where reverence can be observed.
- c. <u>Book Table</u>. In keeping with the evangelistic character of the Breakfast, Christian books or easy reading materials should be made available for sale to members and first timers.
- d. Identification Cards. The breakfast team should have IDs for all breakfast attendees, members, guests or first timers. The National Office will provide the IDs and will bill each chapter/ outreach correspondingly. All first timers must be given IDs without fail. They are to wear them until they are given white IDs.

e. <u>Breakfast Program</u>. Use only the approved Breakfast Program, sample of which is shown in the CDs given to the Mission Directors. This can also be used as a Flyer or Invitation.

III. ONE FEEL

- a. <u>Greeters</u>. A must. This is where the FEEL starts. A team assigned should ensure that everyone is greeted and welcomed joyfully as they come in.
- b. First Timers and/or Blue ID Holders. The Breakfast Head should ensure that they are never left alone. It is suggested that a table for 'first timers and sponsors' be put up and a senior member assigned to 'buddy'.
- Music. Upbeat, joyful, easy-to-sing.
 Ex.: Rise Up, O Men of God, We Are Men of Jesus Christ, Great and Wonderful, etc.
- d. Music Ministry. It is the responsibility of the Music Ministry to enliven the breakfast by singing while attendees are coming in, while waiting for the start of the breakfast program. Music ministry members shall eat when the breakfast is served so as to give members, first timers and sponsors time to talk and update. The music ministry shall teach and lead the gathering songs through their enthusiastic singing; they must not

- 'perform a concert'. The ministry head is to discern the appropriate response song and to conduct regular practices to unify song rendition.
- e. <u>Prayers</u>. Short, friendly to breakfast attendees and first timers, the prayers should preferably be spontaneous. The Emcee shall lead the Prayer-Before-Meals if the breakfast is taken before the program.
- f. Praying over Sharers. This must be short, simple, not done in front of first timers or at the front of the venue, nor done like a mini-worship session. It is recommended to do the praying over in a place or room separate from the main breakfast venue. Pre-assigning the leader to do the pray-over is urged.
- g. Praying by the Breakfast Team. The team must pray before and after the event.
- h. Gospel Reading. No more reading of the Gospel for the day during the opening program. Use the Scriptural Response in reading a gospel that draws out the central message of the sharing.
- Sharing. Sharings should be those that emphasize members' Christian Life and Marketplace Victories. Sharings should be given in the first person and follow the ABCD method – Audible, Brief (45 minutes at maximum), Christ-centered, Don't Preach.
- j. Sharer. Sharers must be active BCBP members. Occasionally, non-members may be allowed to share in a BCBP Breakfast but they must have the expressed approval of the Area Managing Director.
- Back-up Sharer. This is a must in case of no-show of the designated sharer.
- Advance Copy of the sharing is mandatory for first time sharers; it must be reviewed by the BH or the MD. A Writing and Letters Ministry to edit and assist in writing a sharing is encouraged.

- m. Introductions. Just as first timers are aptly introduced, guests or visitors from other chapters/outreaches should also be acknowledged, in keeping with the BCBP being borderless.
- n. Scriptural Response.
 The scriptural response to the sharing should be limited to only one or two verses.
 There should be no interpretation or summation of the sharing.
- Closing Prayer. The closing prayer is to be given by the one who gives the scriptural response. It should be short, friendly to breakfasters and spontaneous.
- p. Emcee. The Emcee must control the flow of the program, its timely start and end. He/She must be a member of the Breakfast Team. The Emcee should do all announcements as well as give a brief talk about the BCBP, its breakfast, and venues for the benefit of the first timers.



- q. <u>Clapping</u>. Clapping by members, especially during the songs, is encouraged to promote a joyful and spontaneous FEEL of the Breakfast. Raising of hands is not encouraged.
- r. Assigning a Unit or an AG. It is the prerogative of the Chapter Governance to assign an Unit or an AG to assist the Breakfast Team. They are not to replace the Breakfast Team, but to augment in conducting the Breakfast, taking on the tasks of Greeters, Registration, Attendance keeping, and Physical Arrangements.
