

PUTTING GOSPEL VALUES TO WORK

In Our Lives, In Our Work, In Our Nation

As I look back over the past 11 years I see that the Lord has blessed the Brotherhood and made it grow up into something that could really be the Lord's instrument in the business world. The Brotherhood fulfills something that Vatican II and subsequent documents like Evangelii Nuntiandi of Pope Paul VI and the latest Christifideles Laici of Pope John Paul emphasized -- that Christians are evangelizers in the world. In our case, this world is the business world, the marketplace.

So often Christian life is only seen in the parish and yet we, who are in business and the professions, spend much more time in our companies than in our parish. And if we don't evangelize from Monday to Friday, then there is no church up to Saturday, because we only go to church basically on Sundays. If we only evangelize - or get evangelized, as the case may be - on Sunday, forgetting our Lord for the rest of the week, I don't think we are fulfilling our role given us by Jesus to be evangelizers in the world.

The Lord has led us little by little to do more and more. We have grown in terms of personal conversion and personal support for BCBP chapter life; we have experienced increasing cohesion among members and commitment to one another. All chapters are experiencing an alive and active chapter life. With the activity of the CLPs going on in this past year, new members have been brought into the Brotherhood and regular members have been strengthened through their dedicated service. When it comes to breakfasts and luncheons, all of them, too, are flourishing, widening our circle of friends in the business community.

Areas For Growth

Where I still see an area of growth in the BCBP's mission is actually winning the marketplace for Christ. I would like to see that the Brotherhood is able to make a real difference in individual businesses so that business practices would change. This doesn't mean that there hasn't been any influence but it hasn't been that visible.

Maybe what would need to happen is that members of the Brotherhood would reach out to their co-managers, evangelize them, and by doing this, gradually increase the number of renewed brothers and sisters in that particular company. Then without domination, or manipulation, or politics or anything like that, this group of brothers and sisters in Christ could try to bring the better Christian alternatives into the company's policies and activities.



Being Bold For Justice and Integrity

Our theme for this year is "Care for Justice, Act with Integrity". In focusing on justice and integrity we have a good opportunity to exercise boldness in espousing the values of Christ in the marketplace. Most of the sharings I have heard, and heard of, are more in the area of personal conversion and family life. Very few brothers are speaking out and telling others what they are doing about the wage issue, graft and corruption, labor relations, or taxes.

We need to know that we are not just one voice crying out in the wilderness. And this is what the Brotherhood is all about. So that we will be many voices caring for justice and acting with integrity in our own respective marketplaces. I look forward to hearing more from BCBP members on what ways, little or big, they are practicing the Brotherhood values of Christianity in their businesses or profes-

We face a year of political uncertainties with most people involved in one way or another with the 1992 elections. I would think this is a practical area in which we could 'care for justice' and 'act with integrity.' We need to inform ourselves about the political candidates, their beliefs and their values, their performance, their character, their sense of justice and integrity. How about their concern for truly being a servant of the people in the position they are running for? Are thery capable of serving the people? Do they espouse values that promote the health of the nation, that will improve its economic, political, social and religious health?

As individual voters we should inform ourselves. Then in the spirit of concern for justice and integrity, we should provide our brothers and sisters, and other business and professional friends, with clear information about the candidates centering in on the issues of their personal life, their past record in public office, and the values they have espoused in public speeches.

He Has Not Finished With Us

From the past I take a lot of confidence that He has not finished with us, that development will continue, that He will make us, as we are faithful to Him more and more, a more effective evangelization team in the business world. This is my greatest hope.

I really believe that the Brotherhood not only can make a difference in the quality of church life and in forming Christians, real Christians, active in the world, transforming the world. But the Brotherhood can also be a building block in helping make the Philippines a country that really cares for all its citizens much more, a Philippines that is developing work places through livelihood enterprises and industries that will make sure that the wealth of our country will benefit the citizens more and more.

With this we can look forward to a life of dignity and a life that will safeguard our children's rights, a life that is both Christian and fully human a life according to the gospel.

This is what I see as the future for the Brotherhood, this is what I see developing under the Lord's grace. And the Lord will never abandon us but be with us as long as we are faithful to Him and as long as we put into practice the values of the gospel.

Loving God and each other is the



These livelihood programs are the answer to our Lord's exhortation, "As often as you did it for one of my least brothers, you did it for me."

Another year has come and gone and as we look back to those eleven years, it would be best to pause and assess the results of our commitments. Have we done enough and could we have done more? We can pat ourselves on the back and point out the many successful programs and activities we were involved in. You will find no one who will disagree, but the question that lingers and requires an answer is, "Could we have done more?"

In the Second Plenary Council of the Philippines, the laity of the Church has been elevated to a partnership role with the clergy in Church affairs. The demand for greater involvement of the laity is a challenge we cannot ignore. The Brotherhood, a lay organization, is expected to play an important role in the evangelization thrust of the Church.

Last year during our 10th anniversary we reflected on the decade past and the decade to come. CARE FOR JUSTICE, ACT WITH INTEGRITY

(Isaiah 56:1)

In 1990 the last year of our first decade, we proclaimed that our God reigns in the Marketplace. This anniversary theme has, since then, acquired a special significance for the Brotherhood. Instead of merely being an annual theme, it has become some kind of a rallying call around which BCBP members can unite

Israelites Took Relationships Seriously

The Israelites were a people who gave serious regard to relationships, so serious that various aspects of relating with one another and with God eventually became "codified" and, through time, put into writing under the Lord's

Isaiah 56:1 could be God's way of reminding us about a time when his people took relationships seriously.

as they go through their second decade bringing Christ to the Marketplace. This is why "Our God Reigns in the Marketplace" is now called our "second decade theme."

This year, our 11th anniversary theme derives from Isaiah 56:1 (the Jerusalem Bible appears to have a better version of this passage for our purposes). It is not intended to replace our decade theme but aims, rather, to fulfill the theme's implied goal. We are saying, in effect, that caring for justice and acting with integrity constitute the first steps towards God's reign in the Marketplace.

Why choose a passage from the Old Testament? Couldn't Matthew 6:33 be more in keeping with our times and circumstances as Christians? The choice of Isaiah 56:1 for our 11th anniversary theme, prayerfully discerned, could be God's way of reminding us about a time when His people took relationships seriously.

guidance. The commandments of God and His rules governing aspects of human conduct elaborated in the Pentateuch have become the "Law" which would guide their behavior towards one another, and their Creator. To Israelites, being "just" or "righteous" — the spirit of the Law — would mean fulfilling the requirements of their relationship with one another and with the Lord.

The history of the Israelites tell us how human frailty has led them many times to disregard the demands of this relationship. The Just God would send now and then a messenger to remind His people about their relationship. At times, the Lord Yahweh is pictured as being at the verge of abandoning an unfaithful people to one form of disaster or another, only to be restrained by the intercession of a few men and women who remained faithful to Him. The intercession of these men and women usually came at a time when disaster was already

in progress such that suffering and death had taken a toll on the people's lives, properties and national dignity.

The Challenge of Justice and Integrity for the New Israel

The same seriousness about relationships remained with the Jewish community by the time Jesus arrived for His earthly ministry. However, the attitude had evolved through the vicissitudes of the Jewish history into something which focused more on form rather than substance. Jesus, the last "Messenger of God" to the original chosen people, attempted to draw His followers away from the "letter" of the Law which the Scribes, Pharisees and Sadducees desperately clung to and perpetrated. He tried to bring His own chosen ones to an operative knowledge of the "spirit" of the Law through His own teachings and example. Eventually, His life's work, death and resurrection paved the way for the coming of the Holy Spirit and the establishment of a "new Israel" embodied by the Church He built upon Peter.

Centuries have passed since Jesus ascended to His throne in heaven after directing His followers to evangelize the world. The first Christians consisted mostly of Jews. Gradually, Gentiles were added to their numbers, a trend foretold by Jesus Himself (John 10:16). This trend accelerated with the missionary thrusts of the apostles. Today, the "New Israel" is made up overwhelmingly by Gentileconverts which include Filipinos among them.



CARE FOR JUSTICE, **ACT WITH INTEGRITY**

(Isaiah 56:1)

What Happened to the Old Covenant?

With this reality, one is led to ask: What could have happened to the original "Old Covenant" concern for the demands of relationships? Has it dissipated with the growth and expansion of the Church and the influx of different cultures into its fold? Has the definition of "justice" or "righteousness" changed through time?"

In a very significant way, the choice of Isaiah 56:1 as the Brotherhood's 1991 theme serves to remind us that 'not one dot, not one little stroke, shall disappear from the Law until its purpose is achieved." (Matt. 5:18) Indeed, Jesus' coming to fulfill the Law continues today under His Spirit's unfailing guidance over the Church which faithfully clings to His words.

The Old Testament passage "Care for Justice, Act with Integrity" reminds us today that the God who loved the old Israel first remains the same God Who loves the New Israel now, a God Who continues to respect the covenant He has entered into with His Chosen People sealed today by the Blood of His Son and confirmed by His Holy Spirit.

Yahweh Has Not Changed

Through time this God, our Lord Yahweh, has not changed a bit in His glory, majesty, wisdom, power and love for His creation. This unchanging God therefore remains true to the covenant He entered into with His people. As the Origin of life. He continues to sustain our lives and the existence of all other earthly life day by day. As Ruler of the universe, He continues to put order in all things around

As our Redeemer, He has already unfolded His plan for our salvation, a plan which continues to unfold today bringing in more and more souls into the ambit of His Eternal Life. As Father, He teaches us through the daily discipline of our lives how to attain perfection as children made in His image and likeness.

The Lord Yahweh expects us to respect our end of the covenant. No less than Jesus Himself stressed this point when He decried the irresponsibility and disregard of those who were supposed to be models in keeping the demands of the relationship between God and the Jews. "Alas for you, scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You who pay your tithe of mint and dill and cumin and have neglected the weightier matters of the Law - justice, mercy, good faith! These you

Love builds on justice or it is not love at all; just as truly, justice rests ultimately on mercy or it has no field in which to work. Mercy and justice are no more rivals in dogged opposition to each other than are justice and love. Mercy does not lessen justice but goes beyond the demands of justice; justice does not cancel out mercy but presupposes it.

should have practiced, without neglecting the others." (Matt. 23:23) Even for mere followers, the Lord Jesus was straightforward about the demands of this relationship: "Set your hearts on His Kingdom first, and on His Righteousness..." (Matt. 6:33)

A Time for Urgency and Concern, for Justice and Integrity

Today, our Lord's reminders and warmings - spiced up here and there with a calamity or disaster - ring with the same urgency and concern just like His exhortations to the original Israel centuries ago through Isaiah. Yahweh has not changed. He wants us all to share His Eternal Life, a privilege we can enjoy only after making sure we have fully met the conditions of our Covenant with Him, conditions which are neither arbitrary (on the part of Yahweh) nor impossible to meet.

Placed in the context of our lives today, to "care for justice" would mean to give due respect - in deed more than in words - to our basic relationships, to our ties with our selves, with other persons in varying contexts (e.g., in our family, our community, our workplace, our society), and with our Sovereign Lord.

To "act with integrity" would mean focusing our whole being and putting all our energies into the pursuit and manifestation of justice in our lives as a response to our Lord Jesus' command that we be perfect as the Father in Heaven is perfect. (Matt. 5:48) A life of integrity for us would therefore mean one that is lived with a singularity or simplicity of purpose that excludes the complications of other attachments and loyalties. It is a life of purity and 'incorruptness' attached only to the one Principle, Standard or Value that surpasses all others: our Lord Jesus Christ.

THE BCBP IS SPECIAL TO US

"We joined the BCBP through the invitation of a family friend who was a member then of both the Ligaya ng Panginoon and the Brotherhood. We wanted to experience what this friend had been sharing with us about his life in the Lord," recounts Serg and Nene Tayag, who graduated CLP 3 on May 5, 1982.

"After the CLP we personally committed to make ourselves available in all BCBP activities, and this is where we have found spiritual nourishment for our personal, family and business lives. We have found the BCBP way of life helpful in knowing an authentic Christian life. What we appreciate most is the constant follow-up in the BCBP through action group leaders. A deep prayer life has helped us not only grow in faith but also to be seriously committed to living out our faith."

We feel that the strengths of the BCBP are rooted in its 'support system' from where members draw their emotional, physical and spiritual strengths within the action groups and up to the unit level. However this support mechanism starts to operate only when members pour in the right amount of mutual love and care, openness, acceptance and faithfulness to their prayer life."

When asked what areas they would like to see improvements in, Serg and Nene replied, "In the areas of respect for others, good order in life, self-discipline among members and especially in the authentic living out of the BCBP teachings in personal, family and business life."

"The BGBP will always take a special place in our hearts; it will always be a part of our life," they said. Pete and Rose Padre

TOPPLING THE WALLS OF JERICHO

"Our having joined the BCBP in 1982 was definitely an intervention of God in our life, considering how allergic Pete was then to anything 'charismatic'. The Lord gently introduced Pete to the BCBP Wednesday Breakfast at Makati Sports Club where Pete wondered what all the boisterous singing was all about as he went for his daily early morning swim."

Rose Padre reminisces.

"One day Jorge Santamaria invited Pete for breakfast and then to the ongoing Christian Life Program No. 3 at Assumption Convent. Pete couldn't say "No" to a good friend. Realizing that the BCBP was a Catholic Renewal Movement, I knew we wouldn't last for twelve meetings. I asked for prayers at the end of every session. What the Lord wants, He gets. We finished our CLP without any absence. Praise God!"

The couple believe that it was the

BCBP that toppled the "walls of Jericho" in their lives. Pete assumed complete headship even as priest of their domestic church; Rose learned complete submission to Pete. Lines of communication were reinforced and revitalized, family prayers and family solidarity were strengthened. They learned to give the Lord prime time in prayer and Scripture reading.

Pete and Rose feel that personal commitment to God and to the BCBP must be sustained through a having strong models of commitment and discipleship among the leadership, and b regular religious and social activities that foster love for God and love for one another.

Though they are now covenanted members of Ang Ligaya ng Panginoon, Pete and Rose still serve their BCBP Alabang chapter, when invited, as speakers in CLPs and BCMRs.

The coordinators of the Ang Ligaya Ng Panginoon Community headed by Fr. Herb Schneider, S.J., met in June 1980 and talked about how the community could bring the values of Jesus's gospel to the marketplace.

The decision was to try doing the same Christian Men's Breakfast then going on at Ligaya's sister community in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in the Word of God community. Two Word of God coordinators, Doug Gavrilides and John Keating ("Blessing and Glory"), were visiting Ligaya so we were able to get their inputs.

Thus at the first Christian Men's Breakfast at the Makati Sports Club our first sharer that July morning was John Keating. There were 25 men from the Ligaya in attendance. Although the breakfast was considered a dry run, it served as the beginning -- as the birth of an important outreach in the market place.

I was named the coordinator-incharge of the Breakfast. Five men were in the steering committee: Mike Joseph Sr., Sal Estrada, Nonoy Seneres, Dennis Isidro and myself. Fr. Herb was the overall director of the Breakfast. Of course, there were other committed men regularly attending. Among them were Steve Joseph, Dick Powell, Wally de Leon, Gene Tamesis, Larry Gamboa, Henry Fernandez, Del Lagdameo, Lu Maloles and other men whose names escape me now.

The first formal breakfast was on July 31, 1980 with Larry Gamboa as sharer. Some 40 men attended to hear Larry share his life as a student at LaSalle and at the University of Michigan, how he married Priscy (daughter of former Chief Justice Claudio Techankee), how he met the Lord and the changes the Lord wrought in his life

It was a small beginning, a fledgling step. But we were confident in the words of our Lord Jesus: 'The reign of God is like a mustard seed which someone took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest seed of all, yet when full grown it is the largest of plants. It becomes so big a shrub that the birds of the sky come and build their nests in its branches." (Matt. 13:31-32)

At that time we didn't know where the Lord would bring the Breakfast. But each time we ended, I'd give a summary of what the Lord seemed to say in the sharing and announce the holding of a Life in the Spirit Seminar (now developed into today's BCBP Christian Life Program).

The Christian Men's Breakfast was only for men -- women could join only on special occasions. The objective was to offer an alternative to secular gatherings of similar nature. In the Breakfast not only was there fellowship among men, more importantly the object was for Jesus to have the opportunity to invite men to follow Him.

So now the Breakfast has graduated into an institution with outreaches and chapters practically everywhere. The BCBP has become a way of life, one that has touched many men and women throughout the Philippines.

Congratulations on your 11th anniversary, the beginning of a new decade. The Lord is indeed faithful -- the reign of God is among you.

WE NEED MORE NUMBERS!

I was one of the dozen or so founders of the BCBP with Fr. Schneider, Spanky Meer, Tony Vasquez, and others. We organized the Brotherhood specifically to evangelize the businessmen and professionals who feel that the Ligaya ng Panginoon was too demanding for them. Through the medium of a weekly breakfast that demands little of their business or professional time, we sought to draw our 'market' to awaken to the realization that we are body and spirit, and that the spirit is by far the more important part of the human being, and that we should therefore give it the proper care and attention that our intelligence and reason tell us.

Although a covenanted Ligaya member, I have religiously attended the weekly breakfast meetings from the very beginning to listen and continue to be inspired by the sharings of members who recount how the Holy Spirit transformed them into adopting the Brotherhood "way of life." This is a two-way benefit, I believe and hope. I find inspiration in listening to the sharings of conversion, and I feel that, perhaps, my continued presence and participation give support to some members of our chapter.







BCBP DONATES FUNDS FOR MT. PINATUBO VICTIMS

Amount Earmarked for Homes for Aetas

On July 18 BCBP Exec. Director Fernando de Larrazabal handed over the Brotherhood's donation of P145,000 to Msgr. Francisco Tantoco, executive director of Caritas Manila. Msgr. Tantoco warmly thanked the BCBP and said that the amount will be earmarked to provide simple homes for the displaced Actas on one of the northern Zambales mountains that is still habitable. The homes, to be constructed of local, indigenous materials, will cost about P4,000 each, good for one Aeta family.

In a talk with Miss Geline Sucgang of the Management and Technical Services Division of Caritas Manila, she reported that as of mid-July they have received P2 million in cash donations plus other donations in kind for the Mt. Pinatubo victims. And more donations are expected. Some are set aside for special relocation projects, like the one for the Actas; others are coursed through Caritas-coordinated Social Action Centers in the various parishes. They feel that these centers are in the best position to keep track of who most needs help in the area, she said.

Caritas Manila is the social development arm of the Archdiocese of Manila. Established on October 25, 1953, by the late Rufino J. Cardinal Santos, it was formerly known as Catholic Charities. Over the years it has grown from a family welfare agency to an organization with an extensive range of projects. These include disaster-originating social development projects, the building of integrated Christian communities (parish based), and special apostolates for prisoners, exploited girls, street children, child refugees, mentally handicapped and the deaf.

Caritas Manila is located at Jesus St., Pandacan, Manila, with P.O. Box 1411, MCPO, Makati, and telephone number 522-0046.



my prayer time was always dry. chapter head advised me to pray with the Psalms. In front of the Blessed Sacrament, I immersed myself in the Psalms and after awhile I felt that I had finally turned a corner leaving the dark clouds of doubt behind.

With the hindrances in smithereens, I felt I could now become God's instrument and do as he willed. Slowly we began to see how the Lord manifested his presence and will for CLP 17.

During the baptism in the Holy Spirit last June 12th, I had a strong sense that the Lord wanted the participants to retain their zeal in its purest form. So instead of advising them to go easy in the sharing of their CLP experiences with others to avoid 'scaring' them, I told them that the Lord wanted them to share and reach out to others. I relayed to them a message I had received that morning during my prayer time before the Blessed Sacrament:

I will bless your flock, I will empower them and send upon them my gifts. Today is a day of great rejoicing; Today is a day of deliverance; Our chains have been broken; from bondage we are freed by our worthy Redeemer, Jesus Christ!

I would not know the real weight of those words until Commitment Night

came when the Lord covered himself

with glory and praise. One after another the CLP graduates came up and proclaimed God's work in them. The father who could not stop sharing the Lord's goodness to his children and friends. The sister who found the Lord by persistence in walking a great distance just to attend a CLP session, whose husband returned to the Lord after an absence of 31 years from the sacraments. The young lady who thought she could not find a new relationship with the Lord but did by learning to rest in Him and listen to His whispers. The young father with a strong new-found faith who wrote a letter to his newly-operated infant boy wanting him to join the Brotherhood as soon as he could so he could marvel in God's works with him. The single mother who found the grace of God to start the process of healing and forgiveness in her family. The young man who despite power and riches in his hands in Wall St. gave up what he had to be true to a calling to fill an emptiness within him. The man who loved the Lord so much that he obeyed an inner urge to go up front to the mike without knowing what to say.

I have never been the same after that night when I cried tears of joy in His presence. I could not contain the joy and grace I experienced which was too much for my small heart to bear. I am glad for the privilege of having been part of God's work, for having been His instrument, for being formed by the touch of the Master, our Lord Jesus Christ.

CLP 17 humbled us all in a call to renew ourselves and to be one with the participants in their fire, gifts and zeal.

CLPs, 11th Anniversary Plans

The Las Pinas chapter has gone through one of its busiest periods in its young history. The months of June, July and August are a period of feverish activities to sustain a Christian Life Program (Baptism set for August 3), prepare for and coordinate Brotherhood's 11th annual celebration (celebration date moved from August 3 to 17), and start preparing for CLP 19 slated for the month of September.

All of these activities unfold along with the regular chapter fare of assemblies, action group meetings, unit leaders' meetings, men's and women's breakfasts, and, for those in responsible positions, the needed chapter governance meetings and leadership training meetings.

The major activities remain to be the CLP 18, and the coordination of the 11th anniversary of the Brotherhood. The CLP promises to add some forty new members to the chapter, an augmentation it badly needs to enable it to attain its evangelization targets. The approach to the 11th anniversary celebration, on the other hand, has changed from previous years' arrangements not merely to ensure economy but also to heed the signs of the times particularly the devastation wrought by Mt. Pinatubo on Filipino lives, livelihood and property.

Palawan Outreach

The Palawan Outreach has completed its Culture Talks for its CLP No. 3. The conduct and completion of the talks constitute a significant step for the outreach in terms of preparing a corps of indigenous speakers who will later take care of the outreach's teaching and formation requirements.

Marindugue Outreach

The prospects for a CLP in Marinduque is still under careful discernment. There is special need to ensure a proper balance of businessmen and professionals who must later constitute the core of BCBP stalwarts in that area. There is also need to determine the Las Pinas chapter's capability to sustain another outreach considering its current resources.

"I love thee freely as men strive for right."



Finding none of my friends available to talk to me there, I went to St. Paul's Bookstore and bought several books. THE EUCHARIST: SACRAMENT OF UNITY

In this issue let us reflect on the Eucharist as the visible sign of the unity of His people in Jesus Christ. We pray with this article that you will experience a deeper and clearer understanding of our Catholic faith and the mystery and power of the

Eucharist in our lives and the life of His Church. -Editor


One moment during my catechetical instruction before my baptism into the Catholic faith a few months before I was married (I had been brought up as a Methodist) stands out in my memory. Fr. Murphy told me that at any particular time all over the world the same liturgy of the Word and of the Eucharist is being celebrated. Anyone attending Mass in the U.S. would hear the same gospel and the same liturgical prayers as someone attending Mass in Europe or in the Philippines. "Wow," I thought, "this is really unity in purpose, unity in prayer!"

And this point still impresses me as one of the strong points in our Catholic faith today. We are a people called by God, *men of every race and tongue, of every people and nation ... (He) made of them a kingdom and priests to serve our God.* (Rev. 5:9,10)

Vatican II in the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, no.9, emphasizes this bond of unity: "It has pleased God, however, to make men holy and save them not merely as individuals, without any mutual bonds, but by making them into a single people, a people which acknowledges him in truth and serves him in holiness."

Unified in Jesus Christ

How is this unity expressed in the Church? Through the Eucharist All Catholics experience the same Jesus



Christ, the same Real Presence in the Eucharist here and now as the early Christians experienced in the early apostolic church. St. Paul confirms this universal bond in his letter to the Corinthian community: "We, many though we are, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf of bread." (1 Cor. 10:17)

One morning during the Mass as the priest said, "Through Him, in Him, and with Him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit..." I was overwhelmed with the realization that through Christ in this sacrament I actually do become one not only with Him but also with men and women throughout the world. I am a member of a world-wide spiritual family

The Work of God



Each of us has a specific task to do: the priest, the lay ministers, the readers, the choir, the ushers, the sacristan, the altar boys, those who take up the collection, those who participate in the offertory procession. And we who sit in the pews have our own work, too. We must have contrite, repentant hearts; we must truly seek Him; we must participate in word and action in the liturgy; we must worship Him for Who He is, our Lord and our God.

We ourselves become members of the royal priesthood (1 Peter 2:9) as we participate in the prayer of the Eucharist. At Mass, each one of us is called to present our life to God as a "living sacrifice" (Rom 12:1), by uniting our life with the perfect, once-for-all sacrifice of Jesus Christ reenacted in the Eucharistic celebration. We must be active participants; in fact, the Roman Catholic code of canon law underlines this participation stating "the Eucharistic celebration should planned to bring about conscious, active, and full participation of the people, motivated by faith, hope, and charity."

Another important task for us during the Mass is to be present, physically and spiritually. For it is our physical presence combined with the presence of all the other people of God that make the Body of Christ what it is, the Church, living, dynamic and growing.

Would we sit back and allow an arm or a leg of one of our loved ones to wither away and die for lack of nourish-



ment or exercise? Of course not! And yet this is what happens when we fail to take our obligation to attend Mass seriously. How can the Body of Christ become strong if its members absent themselves for any reason at all, or attend physically but with their thoughts far away immersed in worldly activities? As the song says: it is better to light just one little candle than to stumble in the dark.

The Prayer of the Whole Church

Because the Eucharist brings before us the central mystery of our Christian faith, namely the passion, death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus, it becomes the prayer of the whole Church, the prayer of the people of God gathered to worship Jesus, our Savior and Great High Priest (Heb 7:26-8:1).

"The liturgy (the Mass) is the summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed; at the same time it is the fountain from which all her power flows. For the goal of apostolic works is that all who are made sons of God by faith and baptism should come together to praise God in the midst of his church, to take part in her sacrifice and to eat the Lord's Supper." (Vat. II, "Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy," no. 10)

In the Mass we are reminded that our faith has sprung from the wellspring of Jesus Christ Himself and that all gifts and power come from God. God challenges us in the Mass not only to accept His Real Presence but to unite with Him by offering ourselves and all our works back to Him in Spirit and in truth.

The Eucharist unites the people of God as a holy nation. It brings communities together, reconciles brothers in love, restores harmony in families and witnesses to all that Jesus is truly alive in the world today.

In the chaotic world today with so many people violently searching for things they cannot find, we Catholics are blessed with a permanent and unifying refuge, Jesus Christ. St. Paul advises us to "draw your strength from the Lord and his mighty power. Put on the armor of God so that you may be able to stand firm against the tactics of the devil... Pray constantly and attentively for all in the holy company." (Eph 6:10-11,18) What better way to don the armor of God and draw our strength from the Lord than through the Mass and regular, sincere participation in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist? Nancy R. Fashion says, "Me, too"; style says, "I only." But for members of Christian organizations such as our own Brother-hood of Christian Businessmen and Professionals, the dress code will make all of us ideally, "Me, too."

Would it be too much to presume that one could actually tell those among us who are high in spirituality like Rose Padre, Nancy Catan, Rose Dee, Haydz Bannigan, among many others, from those who are still struggling? The "strugglers", like myself, cannot do away with material attachment. This becomes evident with the way the "strugglers" dress and adorn themselves. But really, for the

sake of Christ and His teachings, we should start dressing more simply and with less adornment. For those of us who are vain, this is one way we could "die a little for Christ."

In this regard, we could follow a few rules: underdressing is safer than overdressing (this is called understated elegance); wearing a skirt instead of pants in church; wearing modest rather than revealing clothes; considering the occasion and place for one's choice of dress.

Another tip I can think of is to please wear your pin or brooch on the upper left side of your chest, or on the upper left side of your lapel, but never in the center to secure an overlap opening. Pins and brooches are decorative in function. They are meant to accent a dress and help give it a total look.

The best fashion tip I can think of is to add Christian charm to your personality by always wearing a smile. As the saying goes: "Of all the things you wear, your expression is the most important" for the Christian lightens the load of his fellowmen, brings joy everywhere, and is full of Christ-like love for everyone. So please wear a smile, be it for a formal or informal affair, because a smile can never be an overstatement.



IS MASONRY COMPATIBLE WITH CATHOLICISM?

Even though Freemasonry has undergone a change in terms of a greater openness towards other social groups, nevertheless, it has remained totally unaltered in its outlook and in its basic convictions. No one can belong at the same time to the Catholic Church and to Freemasonry. This was the finding of the German Bishops Conference Study in the early 1980's into the question of compatibility of membership in the Catholic Church and in Masonic lodges.

As masonry in the Philippines is substantially identical to German masonry, therefore it is not possible for a Filipino Catholic to be at the same time a member of the Masons. This also holds true of members of the Brotherhood of Christian Businessmen and Professionals according to BCBP Exec. Dir. Fernando de Larrazabal. Being a member of the BCBP is not compatible with being a member of the Masons.

This in-depth study arose out of the change in attitude and approach of some Masonic lodges especially in areas of humanitarian concern and charity for suffering people. Masonry is often presented to the public as a practical undertaking of men of good will. It is in the spirit of respect for the utmost freedom of everyone to hold on to his own beliefs that this 'brotherhood of men' seeks to attain its humanitarian goals.

But Catholics must not be deceived by vague, relative terminologies and expressions of good will. The German bishops pointed out seven areas of incompatibility of Masonic ideology with the Catholic faith. These are: total rejection of dogma and objective Revelation, rejection of any type of magisterial authority, relativism and indifferentism in religious and ideological matters. Freemasonry observes a certain deism in their conception of God as the Supreme Architect and Master Builder.

Whereas the Catholic Faith respects the person who sins but not the sin as such, Masons tolerate all ideas and beliefs, even contradictory ones, since they are indifferent to their truth or falsity. Their humanistic approach to their endeavors tends to glorify themselves and leaves no room for the action of grace on the soul.

Total commitment is demanded from Masons and the sect claims exclusivity in the right of formation of conscience and character of its members. Other significant incompatibilities are shown in the accompanying chart.

Ideology

No fixed ideology binding members. "Freemasonry is probably the only association that was permanently able to keep its ideology mostly free of all dogmas. FM can be understood as an association that tries to bring together people that are relativistically inclined for the promotion of the ideals of humanity." (International Freemasonry Lexicon) All Catholics believe and are bound by a revealed and authentically interpreted Word of God, through the Magisterium of the Church.

Meaning of Truth

There is no such thing as absolute or objective truth. Every truth is relative and subjective. Every member must be a free man who knows no subjection of himself to dogmas or passion. The Truth is found in Jesus Christ who Himself said, "I am the Way, the Truth and Life." John 14:6

Concept of God

In Freemason rituals, the center place is occupied by "the great Master Builder of all worlds." The Great Master Builder is a neutral "it", without further definition. Each member is free to add his own personal understanding of God. There is no objective knowledge of God; human nature and human reason guide the member in all things.

Catholicism has a well-defined theology. God is a revealed God, revealed throughout the ages through His Word, His creation, His prophets, holy men and women, His Church. God is the centerpoint of Catholic belief and all Catholics seek to know and to follow His Will for them. God is a Divine Being in three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Religion and Religious Matters

Although not a religion per se, Masonry tends to become a practical religion which offers its own moral code and rites, supplanting other religious rites, morals and sacraments. If a conflict arises between FM and the member's religion, it is expected that the member will adhere to the Masonic principle of utmost freedom and thereby turn away from his "partisan" religious beliefs. Masonic rituals seek to instill ethical perfection and illumination through symbols and words; justification and grace in the Christian sense are disregarded. As one progresses in levels or degrees, the rites are clothed in secrecy with the member swearing not to reveal anything to the uninitiated.

The Church is apostolic, holy, universal and united as a people in the Body of Christ. The Catholic faith is open, ecumenical, dynamic and revealed, adhering to the teachings of Jesus Christ and the repository of Christian tradition in the Magisterium of the Church. The sacraments are recognized as an important source of God's grace. Everyone is encouraged to study the faith, read the Word of God and share it with others.

WORDS THAT HURT, WORDS THAT HEAL

New Evangelization

WHAT IS THE "GOOD NEWS"?

Tita O. Cerdenia, Alabang Chapter

In his book, "Revolution from the Heart," an Irish Columban missionary named Fr. Niall O'Brien, who has spent most of his life in the Philippines, writes:

"...We are back in the days of the early Church when the apostles had to announce simply and starkly: Jesus is alive! Preaching must return to this 'kerygma', this proclamation. For years the Church had been concentrating on catechesis, or education, and presuming belief. But belief could only be brought about by evangelization — literally translated, the 'announcing of the good news'. One of the results of this inversion was that in many places the faithful were baptized, catechized, sacramentalized, but not

evangelized (italics supplied).

And so priests in their pastoral practice were continually tempted to use pressure of one sort or another instead of the joyful invitation to discipleship."

Fr. O'Brien further commented that this thesis, which he attributed to the French theologian Paul Hitz was 'to profoundly affect the teaching of Paul VI", whose well-known encyclical, "Evangelii Nuntiandi* ("Evangelization in the Modern World") now forms the foundation for most of the Churchil's evangelistic activities. From the above quotation, there seems to be a clear distinction between "evangelization" and "catechesis" and someone once succinctly explained this distinction thus: "The catechist brings information about God; the evangelist brings God."

Jesus: the Good News

What is evangelization? The word is derived from the Greek evangelion, literally translated "good news". But what is the Good News? One gets all kinds of answers: "It's the Bible," says one. "It's what is preached during Sunday Mass," says another. "It's the salvation won for us by Jesus." Fr. Gino Henriquez, head of Lumen 2000 (Evangelization 2000 for Asia) shares this definition of evangelization by Mother Teresa of Calcutta:

"Evangelization is being Jesus to others, so that they in turn can become Jesus to others."

It was Pope Paul VI, in his encyclical, who gives us the bottomline: "Jesus Himself, the Good News of God (Evangelii Nuntiandi, par. #7)."

The Good News is a Person and that Person is Jesus Christ! This Person 'first

of all proclaims a kingdom, the Kingdom of God" (par.#8) and, "as the kernel and center of his Good News, Christ proclaims salvation, this great gift of God which is liberation from everything that oppresses man, but which is above all liberation from sin and the Evil One, in the joy of knowing God and being known by Him, of seeing Him, and of being given over to Him (par.#9). Jesus Christ is the Good News and "there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

The Joy of Knowing God

"The joy of knowing God and being known by Him" -- somehow this is a key element in the proclamation of the Gospel. This brings back memories of

childhood catechesis: "Why did God make us?" "To know Him, to love Him, to

> serve Him here on earth and to be happy with Him forever in heaven." Just another of those things every good Catholic is expected to memorize, along with the Creed and the Ten Commandments.

One is left with the impression they were four independent actions, because no one ever gave the crucial scriptural definition of the word "know"! As in "Adam knew Eve his wife: who conceived and brought forth Cain..." (Gen. 4:1 - Douay Version); or, "How can this be since I do not know man?" (Lk. 1:34 - NAB).

According to Scripture, therefore, to know is to enter into a relationship; not just any relationship, but the most intimate possible relationship; as in the most intimate possible relationship between a man and a woman that produces an offspring! The marvelous implication is that we have a "knowable" God who is keenly interested in us and who desires to enter into an intimacy with us. Definitely not a God who is "watching us from a distance" as that atheistic song goes!

Backing Away From Hell


Like I said, nobody ever explained all these to me before. As a baby, I was bapthe Catholic Church. catechized in Catholic schools, sacramentalized with the Sacraments of Confirmation, Penance (as it was then called) and Holy Communion. I cannot remember anything about the first sacrament, of course, but of the other three, all I can remember were the fear of being slapped by the Bishop, the fear of forgetting some articles of the Creed (the practice before for first-timers was for the priest to review each penitent about the tenets of the faith), and Holy Communion was pure agony when one could not even take a sip of water from midnight so it was quite normal for First Communicants to faint from hunger! (Thanks to Vatican II all these have changed!)

As for Sunday sermons (not homilies), fire and brimstone rained down from pulpits raised way above our heads, forcing the congregation to look up at the priest, who always seemed hell-bent (sorry) in castigating us and did a thoroughly successful job of presenting a fearsome, judgmental and punishing God!

For many of us, our so-called spiritual life consisted of backing away from hell, thereby missing all the fun of going to heaven! Something akin to a bull in a china shop, gingerly picking its way through the aisle; one false move and something was bound to come crashing down. God was a sort of divine accountant who kept a ledger of all debits and credits and the goal was to see to it that at the end, somehow, the credits would be more than the debits so we can all go to that place "somewhere up there" called Heaven.

My Search For God

It was frustrating business as one is never quite sure exactly what entries go into that ledger. At some point in my life, I eventually made the decision to give this God a wide berth. Actually, I believe deep inside me I was not even sure I wanted to spend my eternity with some-



one like that; but, of course, the only other alternative was entirely out of the question.

I longed for answers, for inner peace, love, harmony in my relationships, security, joy -- all the good things. It was only long afterwards that I finally understood that all these longings were my soul's longing for its God. At the time, however, I could only conclude that since I had been in the Church all my life and never found these things, perhaps I could find them somewhere else. I soon found myself in what is now known as the "New Age" religions and for three years I sought God (only it was called "search for enlightenment") and never committed a sin (they were called "growth experiences"). Still, the things I sought remained elusive.

Then God Found Me

Until one day, nine years ago, the search ended. I did not find God, He found me. Someone explained it all and I discovered He has always been there. I discovered I did not have to back away from hell anymore; all I had to do was make an 180 degree turn and I found myself face to face with my God in the person of Jesus! All I could say was, "It was You all the time!"

It is Jesus who reveals the Father and His love for us, His compassion in seeing us separated from Him by sin with no way for us to bridge that gap we created in the first place - unless He Himself did something about it, which He did. "The Word was made flesh, He lived among us" (Jn 1:14) and the gap was no more.


"Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you..." (Jer. 1:4). With these words, everything falls into place. God knew us from eternity. He made us - to know us, to love us, to serve us and to be happy with us for all eternity. As in all things, He did it first. "Love then consists in this: not that we have loved God but that He has loved us (1 Jn 4:10)."

And for our part, they are not four independent actions after all, for to know Him is to love Him; and since we can never love Him as much as He loves us, this love eventually overflows - to others. This overflow of love - isn't that what we call service?

And thus the gift of eternal life, salvation, is ours -- right now, right here. The fullness awaits us in eternity and that is the hope of every true Christian. After all, what is eternal life? Again, Jesus defines it for us: "Eternal life is this: to know You, the one true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent (Jn. 17:3)." Again, "know" as in intimacy.

Jesus Christ IS the Good News of God. His eternal message, the good news He proclaimed, first through the apostles then on through the centuries down to our time is so achingly simple yet infinitely profound:

> "Tatlo kami, Nagmamahalan, Sali ka?"

Commented the catechist who was sitting some distance away, "I can't understand you." (meaning "I can't hear you.")




FIRMS CENTERING ON **IESUS**

Humberto Belli, a former member of the Marxist revolutionary movement in Nicaragua, the Sandinistas, who would later turn Christian and commit himself to Jesus, was in Manila recently to visit with the BCBP and Ang Ligaya ng Panginoon.

In his personal testimony before various Brotherhood chapters, Belli related this incident that made his conversion complete.

"There was this woman sitting under a tree looking at me as if she had something to tell me," Belli told BCBP members. "So I approached her to start a conversation. Instead, she surprised me by asking what I was looking for. I told here I was looking for the truth."

Then, "In a way I can never forget, she told me that I can go all over the world and not find the truth. The truth, she said, came 2000 years ago. The truth is Jesus Christ!"

The Brotherhood of Christian

See each person you meet as one who knows the Lord or is seeking the Lord. Businessmen and Professionals at the turn of the month marked its seventh year of doing God's work in the marketplace. To celebrate the events, members and associates of the Brotherhood last August 1 filled to overflow the cavernous banquet hall of the Valle Verde Country Club in Pasig, east of Manila, for a commemorative breakfast.

The observance of the seven-year jubilee gained added significance as the Brotherhood realigned its leadership with the assumption of Herb Schneider, S.J., as BCBP overall coordinator. Fr. Herb takes the place of Larry Gamboa who moves on as coordinator of the West District of the BCBP's mother community, Ang Ligaya ng Panginoon, as well as head of Ligaya's Institute for Pastoral Development.

The reorganization also gave the Brotherhood its first full-time worker with the appointment of retired airline marketing executive Fernando de Larrazabal, of BCBP Central, as executive director.

OF FROGS AND LIZARDS

Fr. Herb Schneider in a talk during the 9th anniversary of the BCBP told us about frogs and lizards. The clergy can, in a way, he said, be compared to frogs. They are bound to their own particular pond or environment. They have limited access to other areas. People come to them as food comes to the frog; it is oftentimes difficult for the clergy to go out and evangelize people not of their own parish.

BCBP members, on the other hand, are lizards! Lizards go every where, they go out and hunt for food. And the lizard can change its environment by moving elsewhere. Similarly the BCBP lizard/member can go out into the marketplace and evangelize. We can work to change our environment. We don't have to wait for people to approach us to tell them about Christ, we can bring Christ wherever we go to all the people we meet.


In addition to their regular monthly second Saturday breakfasts, the women of the BCBP South Chapter initiated a Children's Formation Program several years ago which has grown into a full-fledged chapter activity and has even branched out into a Youth Formation Program.

Early in 1989 in response to the clamor from the BCBP ladies of the North to have a

From the seed first planted in Makati, there are now active women's activities in all BCBP chapters and outreaches. "Those of us in service in these activities soon find out that it is in bringing other women into a deeper personal relationship with our Lord that we ourselves come to know Him better and to more clearly understand His ways," says Nancy Catan, one of the former Makati luncheon heads.

Bacolod Outreach

YESTERDAY, TODAY, TOMORROW

April 13, 1991, marked the start of the 4th Christian Life Program of the Bacolod Outreach. A total of 59 participants, 20 couples and 20 singles, attended the Saturday afternoon sessions held at the Villamonte Parish Church. Completed in July, the CLP was led by course leader Tony Garcia assisted by Toti Diaz. CLP speakers were Louie Morales, Jess Gregori, Digoy Montalvo, Ed Locsin, Tony Garcia, Louie Ledesma, Art Legarde, Boy and Yvonne Gustilo, Butch Ebreo and Ray Garcia.

Looking back, the Bacolod Outreach has really grown a lot in more ways than one, both in quantity and in quality.

Through the mysterious way of our Lord, Alex Espiritu, a member of the BCBP in Manila, was reassigned to Bacolod in 1987; and he, together with a core group composed of 8 businessmen, initiated the organization of the men's breakfast. The first organizational meeting was held on November 20, 1987. Dickie Schulze of the then Central Chapter acted as the Manila Coordinator.

Two months later, on January 23, 1988, the Bacolod Breakfast started with 45 attendees and 9 brothers from Manila. Lito Urgino was the sharer. From that time until 1989, the other chapters headed by Alabang supported Bacolod by sending the sharers. Last year Alabang began sending only one sharer per month which paved the way for the local sharers. An exchange of sharers between Cebu and Bacolod was started during the year.

The growth of Bacolod did not stop with the men's breakfasts. In October 1989, the Christian Life Program #1 was started with the Alabang Chapter providing the service team and the speakers. Course leader for that CLP was Alex Espiritu, then the outreach head. This course saw a total of 51 graduating into a new life with the Lord.

But 1990 is really the birth year of the outreach since the first batch of full members graduated from the CLP only in November 1989. Moreover, the form of the outreach only took place in 1990 with the formation of the action groups and the start of certain services that provide support and nourishment to the community members.

From May 5 to June 9, 1990, a total of 34 graduated from CLP #2. This time, Ray Gar-

cia was the course leader.

The ladies' breakfast began in July 1990 with a core group headed by Azela Kilayko. The sharers for 1990 were all from Cebu. For 1991 all sharers are from Bacolod.

In August 1990, it seemed as if the mission of Alex Espiritu in Bacolod was fulfilled for he was transferred to Davao, and Ray Garcia took over as outreach head. After that, a BCMR was supposed to be held in Bacolod in September, but due to the unavailability of an appropriate venue, the BCMR was held in Cebu jointly with the Cebu outreach. 15 couples from Bacolod attended, together with 2 couples and a single member joining the service team.

CLP #3 began on October 27 and ended on Dec. 8, 1990, adding another 46 members to the community, bringing the total count at that time to 117 full members.

Bacolod started as one single unit; now there are already 3 units with 12 action groups, a total membership of 45 couples and 24 singles composed of 9 men and 15 women. And this count does not yet include the recently graduated members from CLP #4!

Unit leaders are Monet Kilayko, Louie Ledesma and Digoy Montalvo. They, together with Roding Salazar, Bodie del Castillo, Boy Ereneta and Junie Bantug, compose the Governance Body. Services such as the teaching ministry and the music ministry have been formed with plans afoot for the formation of additional services like the youth formation and leaders' formation.

For 1991, Bacolod outreach plans to hold 2 CLPs and one BCMR.

As an outreach, Bacolod continues to enjoy the active support of the Alabang chapter led by Louie Morales who with Alabang mission director Tony Pedro, regularly visits Bacolod. Last year Hermic Rodil was the Alabang coordinator for Bacolod; this year Ferdie Baena takes over as coordinator.

Next year?? "With God, nothing is impossible!"

GRACE NEVER SAYS: "ENOUGH!"

I am reading a little book I came across at one of the book exhibits during the First International Charismatic Congress. The title is "Imitation of Mary" by French Jesuit Alexandre de Rouville. One of the meditative messages seems to me singularly appropriate to us to reflect on as we celebrate the first year of the BCBP's second decade of bringing Christ into the marketplace. I would like to share it with you.

Mary speaks: "My child, if you want to grow in the grace that makes you a friend and child of God, a temple of the Holy Spirit, a brother of Christ and a coheir with Him, then flee the world, love prayer, receive the sacraments often, and apply your-self to the practice of the virtues proper to your state.

"One very special means of increasing habitual grace in yourself is to be faithful to the inspirations brought by actual grace. Listen to the voice that speaks within you and be guided by its urgings. The more you listen to it, the more it will teach you. The more you advance, the more it will teach you to do new and greater things.

"Many walk for a while in the path of virtue but then are satisfied with the distance they have gone. But grace never says: "Enough!"

"Others think they are doing a great deal if they do not slip into evil. Yet that is not enough; for the good man must strive daily to become better.

"Many a Christian will be surprised on the day of judgment to see himself heavily in debt to God's justice because he did not make use of the means given him for becoming a great saint!

"On the path of virtue, not to advance is to go backwards; not to gain is to lose.

"When we set limits to our service of God, God does not respond by setting limits to His benefits. On the other hand, the more generous we are toward Him, the more generous and liberal He will be toward us, even in this life.

"However few our treasures in this world, they are always sufficient; but we can never have too many of the benefits of grace.

"The servant who fails to take care of the possessions his master has entrusted to him will be punished. Therefore, shake off your sluggishness, my child, for it may turn into a deadly lethargy. Try to make up for lost time. Stop saying you are satisfied with the last place in the heavenly Father's house (Jn 14,2); for if you talk that way you run the risk of having no place at all."

May we never be satisfied with our past 11 years' achievements. May we continue to desire and allow God's blessings and graces to grow in us and in the Brotherhood of Christian Businessmen and Professionals.


