

FRST THINGS

FIRST

IN MATTHEW 6:33, we read one of the most famous sayings of Jesus: "Seek first [God's] kingdom and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added to you."

First things first, he says. And this is Jesus' advice to all persons in all walks of life, businessmen and professionals included.

Putting first things first, of course, makes sense. Even Stephen Covey urges his management followers to make this a habit. We should ask ourselves, "What one thing could you do that if you did it on a regular basis would make a tremendous positive difference in your personal, (business and professional) life?" Once you answer that, he says, then just do it and it will make a positive difference in life. Don't waste your time on anything else but that.

Modern time management techniques say that you must be able to identify matters that are urgent and important. The effective manager is the one that is able to cut down on work that is neither urgent nor important, and concentrate on the really important matters even before these become urgent. An effective manager is the one that is able to say "no" to those activities that are neither urgent nor important to him. Jesus knew what is important. But do we?

How often have we failed to start the day with prayer and worship and listening to the Lord's guidance because we are engrossed in our business schedule, or we are rushing for that 5:30 a.m. tee-off at the golf course? How often have we greeted each morning with a newspaper in hand, reading the business and political news, instead of a bible in hand, reading the good news of salvation?

A simple test should prove where your heart is. If somebody announces that they are giving away a free, brand new Mercedes Benz to anyone who says he believes in flying saucers, which of you would go to that place immediately? What if the offer was repeated every day, each time with a larger prize? I am sure you would go there everyday, once you have proven to yourself that it is no hoax.

But what if they announce that somewhere in your neighborhood they are giving away each morning, for free, the bread of life, living water, the Lamb of God, eternal salvation, provided that all you have to do is say that you believe in this man called Jesus? Would you go out of your way to that place and receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist each morning?

Put first things first. Put God first. Christianity costs money, but God is good, God is generous, God will provide. Begin to say "no" to those activities that prevent you from seeking God first. Try it, say "yes" to Jesus, and live to spread the good news that this is no hoax.

View From Within

The SEASON of

SX ASCISION S

FOR HE SENT HIS ONLY SON, the eternal word, who enlightens all men so that He might dwell among men and tell them of the innermost being of God (Jn. 1:1-8). The "word made flesh", Jesus Christ, was thus sent as "a man to man". In God's wisdom and goodness He chose to reveal himself and to make known to us the hidden purpose of His will (Eph. 1:9) by which through Christ, man might, in the Holy Spirit, have access to the Father and come to share in the divine nature.

Christ's birth was an expression of God's omnipotence, a sacrament of piety for the redemption of man. The hand that assumed clay to make our flesh deigned to assume a body for our salvation (St. Chrysologus).

Advent is an expectation and a preparation. Since it is a moment of expectation, it entails waiting. Waiting causes us to be anxious, to be excited, to be happy, to have hope! We wait as we anticipate the celebration of Jesus's birth.

How then do we wait for Jesus? How many times has God come to our lives unexpectedly even taking advantage of different situations and events to show us his love and call us to conversion? As Christians, we can announce Christ's coming by letting a greater set of values animate our actions, by changing our lives, by becoming living witness of His goodness and love, by exhorting people to turn from their sinful ways, by spreading the spirit of peace and sharing. We should prepare the way for Him.

We should be the John the Baptist of our times, who is the perfect example of a Christian evangelizer, who preaches hope and conversion. We should prepare the way for God's unique intervention for goodness and grace come from Him alone and we are only His instruments. We should be humble and full of hope like John. We, too, should live and exhort the values that John taught all of us to embrace: justice, fairness, sharing, honesty, integrity and love. As Christians, we can then make a very strong statement that we are waiting for Someone greater, as John puts it: "He comes after me but He is greater that I am, because He existed even before I was born. (Jn. 1:15)

The whole ambience of Christmas has to do with promises fulfilled. "Let us see this wonderful thing that has happened which the Lord has told us about" (Luke 2:15). Christmas is a "promised season", the time to realize that what has been promised to Abraham and his descendants can come to pass. For us, it is a good time to focus on the promises we have

made and this is a time to be certain that what we promise, we can bring about: our promises to conquer our selfishness, to love as He has loved and to be pure and holy for the Lord.

As we look forward in Advent to the coming of Christ, we should ask ourselves how we are going to interpret and live what we believe happens in Christmas so that we will be able to appreciate what the angel announced at the first Christmas: "I announce to you good news of great joy which will be for the whole people: to you this day there is born in the city of David a Savior who is Messiah and Lord." (Luke 2:10-11).#

Saints

During the last two months of the year, we remember saints, souls, and holy men and women who have been recognized by the Catholic Church as model Christians. Kapatiran presents some of the lesser-known saints and offers us a chance to reflect on how we, too, can become saints.

WHENEVER I USED to think of saints, I would picture holy people in unending prayer, or doing works of mercy, or being martyred for their unwavering faith. That is, until I came across a little book filled with fun facts about saints. Although written for children, 115 Saintly Fun Facts by Bernadette McCarver Snyder opened my eyes to the fact that saints were people just like us, and they not only lived good lives but had a lot of fun and excitement doing it.

For instance, take the case of St. Gall, an Irishman who just loved fishing. He spent a lot of time preaching and converting people to Christianity, but in his spare time you could find him on the banks of a river or lake fishing. In his later life, he became a hermit — the place where he lived in solitude and prayer was near a river known for its good fishing!

And then there was the comedian Genesius who was a member of a dramatic troupe that put on funny plays during the time of the early Christians. One day they were asked to entertain the emperor so they decided to perform a play making fun of the Christians' baptismal rituals. Genesius played the lead role pretending he wanted to become a Christian.

But an even funnier thing happened! In the middle of the play, he was filled with a great love of God and really did want to become a Christian. When the play was over, he told everyone that God had touched him and then was really baptized a Christian. He tried to play a joke on God, instead God played a happy joke on Genesius!

Did you know that St. John Bosco was an acrobat, a juggler and a magician? When he first started working with young boys teaching them how to love God and have a happy life, they paid little attention to him. So he had to resort to stunts and magic tricks with lessons sandwiched in between so that they would laugh and learn at the same time.

Then there are saints whose lives are spicier than soap operas! One of them, St. Adelaide, is called the "good news-bad news" saint.

Good news! When she was 16 years old she married the king of Italy and became a queen. Bad news! Three years later the king died; his successor threw Adelaide into prison. Good news! Within a year, the German king invaded, won the kingdom, freed Adelaide from prison and married her! They had three sons and she took an active part in affairs of state. Bad news! The king died and his sons who ruled after him had Adelaide thrown out of the court in disgrace. Good news! When the rule went to her grandson, Adelaide returned as regent and was a prudent and understanding ruler of the kingdom. In spite of her "soap opera" life, Adelaide was a woman of prayer and charitable works among the poor. For being able to turn bad news into good news, she became a saint.

Alexander, the charcoal-burner, became a bishop as the result of a sarcastic joke the townspeople made to a visiting bishop. The town needed a bishop, but the townspeople wanted someone influential and wealthy while the visiting bishop Gregory didn't agree with any of their proposed choices.



A strong faith in God, a thankful heart, unsurmountable patience and love. These are what it takes if you have been blessed with a special child. And these are what Bobby Laviña, BCBP National Treasurer, and wife Marite, have in dealing with their Rurik, an ADHD-dyslexic child.

RURIK: Our special gift from God

Bobby and Marite Laviña, Greenhills Chapter

ON AUGUST 23, 1982, the Lord blessed our family with a second son, who was born with a hole in his heart. For the first few years of his life, he was constantly under the threat of open heart surgery. However, with God's help and the solicitous care and concern of Dr. Charles Cuaso, a very good pediatric cardiologist, he was able to thrive.

In 1991, Dr. Lourdes Carandang and Dr. Lourdes Ledesma, two very eminent psychologists, diagnosed Rurik as a dyslexic child with an attention deficit-hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). ADHD children, we were told, chronically daydream. They are often very bright, but they have trouble attending to any one topic for very long. They are full of energy and have trouble staying put. They can be quite impulsive in saying or doing whatever comes to mind, and they find distractions impossible to resist. Dr. Edward M. Hallowell, who confesses to have ADHD, paints a clearer picture of ADHD people. He writes:

"ADHD people don't focus very well; they have to strain to see clearly. They have trouble attending to one task at a time. Hallmark symptoms of ADHD are easy distractibility, impulsivity and sometimes, but not always, hyperactivity or excess energy. They procrastinate a lot and they have trouble finishing things. Their moods can be quite unstable, going from high to low in the bat of an eye for no apparent reason. Their memories are porous. They daydream a lot.

"Many people who have ADHD are very smart. It's just that their smartness gets tangled up inside."

A child who has ADHD, therefore, is a child in a very difficult and trying situation. In Rurik's case, this condition is aggravated because on top of having ADHD, he also has dyslexia. A dyslexis child is one who has trouble spelling, reading and writing because the letters of words keep switching places. For example, he sees the word *cat* as either *act* or *tac*. This becomes even more complicated when words are strung together to make a sentence

because words in sentences change places. A simple sentence like *The cat is brown* could be seen *as tac borwn. is heT* where even the punctuation marks are misplaced. According to the work of Albert Galaburda at Harvard:

"The brains of dyslexics appear to be different from normal brains in that they have nodules on the cerebral cortex which may interfere with how the brain perceives and processes the phonemes or sound bits that make up words. The underlying processing problem in turn leads to the problems in reading, spelling and writing."

Because of these difficulties, dyslexic children have very short, erratic attentions spans, are restless, easily distracted and would prefer to direct their energies into doing other less stressful activities.

We were made to understand, however, that while the symptoms of ADHD can mimic dyslexia, the two are separate disorders and therefore the treatments for the two conditions are different. We also learned that there is no cure for ADHD or dyslexia; all that could be done is to teach the child how to live with it.

As an ADHD-dyslexic child, Rurik had a difficult time coping in Ateneo which is a very structured, traditional school. By the time he was in Grade 3, his self-image and self-esteem had been eroded by impatient teachers who unkindly labelled him as either lazy, slow or too distracted.

It was then that we asked the Lord to help us look for a suitable school which would help rebuild his self-esteem and teach him lovingly, patiently. The answer came in early June, very close to the opening of classes, after we had already enrolled Rurik in Ateneo and bought all his books; the school was Maria Montessori Children's School Foundation (MMCSFI) in Pasay City.

Before going, we prayed that the Lord would pave the way for us if this was the right school for Rurik. When we got there, everything just fell into place.

He was very worried because without them he couldn't get back to heaven.


Rurik loved the school at once, and the Executive Directress offered to give Rurik the entrance exam that very same afternoon. Two days later, we were advised that he had passed and had been accepted!

The love and care of the entire MMCSFI community has gradually built up Rurik's self-esteem. He is now a happy teenager who is so securely sure of himself. But that is not all. In the early part of 1995, our Lord led us to Dr. Lourdes Cortez, someone who understood and emphatized with us because she too is a mother of a dyslexic child. (We later found out that she was a Ligaya ng Panginoon member as well.) By patiently handling Rurik's therapy, she has helped Rurik improve not only his penmanship but also his

spelling and composition skills. She also referred to us Dr. Edwin Bien who pinpointed that Rurik's irritability, lack of concentration and forgetfulness is partially caused by hypoglycaemia, which meant that his blood sugar level was very low. By carefully following a strict diet, Dr. Bien assured us that Rurik will be able to improve his memory and have longer periods of concentration.

Rurik today is a mischievous, gregarious, charming 13year-old who has brought joy to our family and to his multitude of friends. We know that there are more mountains for him to climb, more obstacles to hurdle, more challenges to meet. But our family is confident and Rurik is undaunted because we know that Jesus is there with him every step of the way. #

Write your annual end-of-the-year letter as a family activity and make it fun. If you have relatives that you don't see very often or who live far away, suggest to your children that they give them a year's membership in the Letter of the Month Club. That means they have to guarantee 12 letters over the next year, one each month. Make a deal with your spouse to exchange love letters on Christmas Eve or on New Year's Eve. If you can't think of what to say, start yourself off with these lines from Elizabeth Barrett Browning: "How do I love thee? Let me count the ways." Then each of you count at least 10 things you love about the other.

Enhance the significance of the holiday by "freezing" it. Have your children write a letter to their future children explaining "What Christmas means to me this year." Why don't you write your own letter to your future grandchildren, too? Store their letters in a safe place so that in future years you will be able to pass them on to your grandchildren and their children. These letters, if written every year, will help you, in future years, relive Christmases past. -Family Circle

Stress Management Tips for Parents with Teeners

ONE OF THE GREATEST TIMES of stress for families is when those angelic little kids become teenagers and start to seek out their own destiny in life. This period becomes even more critical in today's complex society that tempts the young people with the tantalizing visions of sex, alcohol, drugs and independence camouflaging the realities of AIDS, violence, addictions and sin.

But the teeners are not alone in their turmoil. Parents of teeners are equally affected as they are faced with watching their

young ones transpose from being individuals for whom they've done everything for thirteen years to young men and women who suddenly want to do things by themselves in their own way.

Dr. Andrew Goliszek in his book: 60 Second Stress Management (Bantam Books, Great Britain. c1993) advocates parents developing a greater tolerance toward their teeners. He proposes creating a more stress-free home environment by following some simple stress management control do's and don'ts which we are sharing with you.

Don't turn holiday cheer

STRESS LEVELS SEEM to reach an all-time high around holiday season. Pressure to spend, eat rich foods, skip exercise, travel far and please everyone (except yourself!) have a way of turning holiday cheer into holiday tension. But you can keep your cool.

Here are some recommended by Woman's Day.

Put a cap on holiday spending

Unmanageable bills will produce sleepless nights once the season is over.

 Decide what you can spend and diligently stick to your budget.

 Don't last minute shop. You'll cave in to time constraints or get carried away by the spirit of the season.

And remember, a great gift doesn't have to break the bank.

Plan a sensible feast

Most of us are watching some aspect of our diet. Whether it's calorie control, limiting fat or avoiding extra salt, keep food appropriate for you and your guests.

Don't push food or alcohol on anyone; he or she may have an important reason for turning down a dessert or wine with dinner.

If you do eat more than you'd planned, compensate with exercise: Walking a kilometer or two helps minimize the calories that stay behind as added poundage.

Begin or stick to your exercise program

There's simply no better tranquilizer than exercise. It improves cardiovascular fitness (walking just 3 kms. three times a week significantly reduces your risk for heart disease), raises the level of chemicals (endorphins) in the brain that guarantee a sense of well-being, and improves strength, flexibility and endurance. A few caveats:

- Avoid even mild exercise in very cold weather if you suffer from coronary artery disease.
- Some asthma is cold-induced, so wear a scarf over your nose and mouth when temperature plummet.
 - Don't start exercising until you've had a physical exam

and, if over 40, a stress test. Simple brisk walking is a typically safe start, and quite enough to defuse tension.

Colds and stuffy nose can

Travel healthy

make airplane flights a disaster; see your doctor before flying. Depending on your condition, a combination of nasal decongestant and, if needed, an antibiotic and even some steroids can help you avoid a painful earache and perhaps even perforated eardrum.

Also carry with you a prescription antibiotic to relieve fever and severe diarrhea caused by food poisoning. If you get seri-

ously ill with gastroenteritis, avoid drugs that suppress stools; they can prolong fever and infection.

Get enough rest

Too little sleep produces anxiety and intensifies depression. Pay attention to your body rhythms: Are you happiest in bed by 10 p.m.? Then pushing for several nights in a row isn't reasonable, no matter how delicious the invitations!

Should insomnia be a problem, avoid alcohol with your evening meal although it may initially relax you, there's an inevitable rebound that leaves many people awake and jumpy at 3 a.m.

Reserve time for yourself

This season of endings and of new beginnings can present important challenges. Use the freedom from work and your usual responsibilities to list what was good and valuable about the year you've just finished. Set some simple goals for the next. Above all, keep your expectations and efforts within reason. Have a happy holiday! - Philippine Daily Inquirer, Dec. 22, 1994

I tried evaluating my driving skill. Was I a slow, fast, reckless, or average driver? But more importantly, as a BCBP driver, how were my manners, attitude, my over-all performance on the road? Because as a BCBP driver I must not only observe traffic rules, I should also observe Christian values.

Thanks to the BCBP sticker on my car, it reminds me to drive carefully and conscientiously follow the rules so as not to be a big disgrace to the Brotherhood. They say, if a car is slow moving and unsure of its maneuvers, "no wonder, it's a lady driver." But if the car zooms like hell, don't be surprised, it's most likely a male accelerator tripper.

But the point is with or without a sticker at the back of my car, the journey is not between me and the traffic aide, but more of me and my God. I alone am responsible for my passengers and the people on the road. By invoking God's presence in my hands and feet, in my senses, I can overcome anger which may be brought about by a fellow driver's inconsiderate style of driving. It takes only a few minutes to cool down a boiling head but it takes months to remove a plaster cast and worst, forever to wait for a replacement for my shattered permanent teeth. Major issues concerning the Brotherhood of Christian Businessmen and Professionals were resolved during the National Strategic Planning Retreat held at the Capuchin Retreat Center (CRC) in Tagaytay last Sept. 1-3, 1995.

Thirty-eight participants composed of the National Council members and the chapter heads and mission directors of the different chapters from all over the country converged at the CRC for two and a half days to settle some of the issues that confront the Brotherhood.

The conference was no ordinary meeting of minds, according to BCBP president Manny Banigan. Activity centered on praising and worshiping God invoking His divine intervention for the conference. The product of the retreat, as most of the participants believed, had the full guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Among the major issues resolved are the following:

MISSION AND VISION OF THE BCBP

The statement of vision and mission of the BCBP remains unchanged. The participants recognized that the BCBP has succeeded in establishing a culture that strengthens individual, personal spiritual conversion and growth. The need for a sound, Christ-centered marital and family life is emphasized.

However, it was felt that the BCBP should begin to focus more on its calling to bring Christ into the marketplace, noting that this calling is unique to the BCBP (vis-a-vis other charismatic renewal groups). We should therefore orient our community life and support teachings, and evangelistic efforts towards making a Christ-centered impact in the work place of our members. The survey results show that the BCBP members have not imbibed this workplace orientation and mission in their view of their role and the BCBP's thrusts.

There is therefore a need to enunciate this aspect clearly to the entire membership in order to gain a shared vision of unique calling of the BCBP.

The Lord has called us for a specific purpose, namely the transformation of the marketplace. The BCBP therefore ought to fulfill and satisfy what the Lord has commanded it to do. BCBP must sustain its

unique evangelistic mission capitalizing on its community strengths. But in order to be effective, BCBP should cultivate a commitment to this common purpose and mission.

BCBP EVANGELIZATION STATE-MENT

Evangelization by the BCBP means "creating disciples of Christ in the businesses and professions, who bring about a transformation of the marketplace by living out Christian values and practices not only in their personal and family lives, but more particularly in their respective businesses and professions."

This evangelization statement has four key components:

Creating disciples of Christ - This essential aspect of the evangelization process involves bringing people through the process of spiritual conversion, commitment and commissioning. This process of personal renewal is standardized throughout the entire BCBP community, and is the means by which people enter and participate in BCBP community life.

The businesses and the professions- The BCBP "marketplace" is the world of commerce and government and economics. This means that members, and those whom we call disciples of Christ, are persons who operate in the marketplace, namely the businessmen and the professionals.

Bringing about a transformation of the marketplace -The marketplace is the battleground. It is here, in the economic and business world next page pls.

where people pursue money and wealth and power. Unfortunately, in so doing, they tend to compromise their faith in and love for God. In the marketplace, it is not only the individuals themselves who are prone to temptations and destructive ways, but it is also the institutionalized systems, practices and cultures that make it even more difficult for the righteous to survive.

The marketplace not only influences the economic situation of the society but also social culture, lifestyle, and quality of life. Therefore there is great potential to transform society if the marketplace itself is transformed.

This is the core of the BCBP mission -- to bring about a visible transformation of the marketplace so that gospel values are adopted and practiced in the day-to-day conduct of the businesses and professions where the member exerts authority or influence.

Living out Christian values and practices. - By the power of the Holy Spirit, the BCBP member lives out Christian values and practices in his place of work. Through the boldness of his actions, decisions and business and professional dealings, as well as personal testimony he is

able to bring the good news of Jesus Christ among those he deals. By these means, he invites his colleagues, associates, suppliers, customers, clientele, and others to a fuller life in Christ.

ACTION ITEMS TO BE DONE IMME-DIATELY BY EACH CHAPTER

In order to get all members in the Chapters to become more sensitive and more responsive to the evangelistic mission of the BCBP, we must encourage our members to talk about their struggles and their victories in winning the marketplace over to Christ. Many of the public testimonies in the past have centered on experiences in one's personal life or family life. Without necessarily removing this element of personal and family renewal, we should begin to re-orient these testimonies towards the essential aspect of our calling, namely the renewal of the marketplace.

Breakfast sharings - testimonies by brothers should highlight workplace victories, in addition to personal renewal.

<u>Assemblies</u> - members should be encouraged to share about their victories in the marketplace.

Action Group meetings - prayers, sharings and fellowship next page pls.

CRITERIA FOR MEMBERSHIP IN THE BCBP

A BCBP member is a businessman or professional who influences change leading to Christ-centered behavior and practices in his sphere of work. He is a disciple of Jesus Christ and has integrated the Lord's teachings into his total life. He gains support and grows spiritually through his active involvement in the Church and in the Brotherhood of Christian Businessmen and Professionals.

In so defining membership in BCBP in this way, the following issues were clarified. Please understand that these clarifications are not meant to be an exhaustive description of qualifications, commitments, or criteria for membership.

"Leadership" - The traditional description of "captain of industry" has been replaced with a broader definition. We now refer to the member as a "businessman or professional who exerts influence in his place of work", whether out of his position of authority or leadership, or simply out of his own effective dealings with those whom he works and comes into contact with. This broader definition admits faith in the providential power of the Holy Spirit to use whomever is called and chosen.

The focus should therefore not be on the corporate title or rank of the person in his work organization but on his capability to influence change and bring about Christ-centered values and practices in the workplace. Thus, the ability to become an agent of change, and a powerful witness and to lead transformation become the criteria for membership.

This definition of membership applies not only to men but also to women who are engaged in the businesses and professions.

Active participation in BCBP activities - The member must be a true disciple who has fully imbibed the BCBP

culture. This means that he must be an active participant in all aspects of BCBP life, including the Action Group structure.

Minimum attendance compliance— As a measure of his commitment to the life and practices of the BCBP, it is essential that the BCBP member must attend at least 50% of every BCBP activity. This will be evaluated and monitored on a quarterly basis.

State of life and belief prior to joining the BCLP - Official membership in the BCBP occurs after a person completes the BCLP and commitment process. The new member commits to renounce all forms of serious wrongdoing and un-Christian relationships and commitments. Examples of such include adulterous relationships, membership in non-Christian cults or organizations, drug or alcohol-related abuse. If necessary, with the guidance of his Action Group Leader, he establishes a time-bound program that will result in amending such relationships, commitments or wrongdoing.

It is not necessary that candidates to the BCLPs need to have reformed their ways of serious wrongdoing and associations prior to attending the BCLP. However, it is up to the sponsoring member and the participant's Discussion Leader to disclose any underlying problem that may exist. It is recognized that the BCLP is geared towards spiritual renewal, and therefore cases which truly require professional psychiatric or medical help need to be referred to other competent parties.

A separate, specific directive will be released by the National Council with respect to the matter of members and BCLP participants who belong to the Freemasonry.

Harness Action Group resources-Members of each Action Group are asked to collectively care for any Breakfast firsttimer or BCLP participant which is sponsored by a member in that Action Group.

In addition to re-orienting the content of the testimonies, each Chapter must begin to develop a means by which the members are supported and encouraged to evangelize in the marketplace. Action Group Leaders should regularly monitor how each of their members is doing in this respect so that proper action can be taken. And this information must be passed on to Unit Leaders, and the Unit Leaders report this to the Chapter Heads.

ACTION ITEMS TO BE DONE IMME-DIATELY BY INDIVIDUAL BCBP MEMBERS

The following activities comprise a list of essential tasks which each individual BCBP member who is engaged in the marketplace is expected to undertake. This list is an initial effort to specifically indicate those "cultural" practices unique to BCBP that members are expected to perform in their respective work environments.

 Start each workday with prayer together with work/officemates.

-Start and end meetings with a prayer.

-Remove from office or work area anything that is not of God, and replace these with things of God (as far as your authority allows).

-Take active part in value formation in your workplace (newsletters, seminars, etc.).

- Take initiative in holding Christian renewal programs (e.g., LSS, retreats) in your organization.

-Personally witness in your marketplace.

PROJECTS TO BE ASSIGNED TO SPECIAL TASK FORCES

A number of critical programs need to be undertaken in order to reinforce and strengthen this evangelistic thrust of the BCBP. Special task forces shall be organized to develop these programs commissioned by the National Council. The approved output of these task forces will be disseminated nationwide to all the Chapters for their guidance and implementation.

Task Force to Develop a BCBP Code Of Values. - This code of values will contain what is important to the BCBP member and what will cont. on p. 29

Relampagos says the Lord willed his election

"He has a plan and purpose for me in the service of our people," said Brother Rene Relampagos of his unprecedented and overwhelming election as governor of the province of Bohol last May 2, 1995.




Children's Formation Field Trip

Abstracts from Harvard Business Review's

15 Business Classics: Fifteen Key Concepts for Managerial Success

What Makes a Good Salesman

David Mayer and Herbert M. Greenberg

"Our basic theory is that a good salesman must have at least two basic qualities: empathy and ego drive."

Empathy, the ability to feel as the other fellow does, helps the salesman get powerful feedback (whether stated or implied) from his prospect or client. He senses the reactions of the customer and is able to adjust to these reactions. He functions in terms of real interaction between himself and the customer.

A good salesman should possess a particular kind of ego drive which makes him want and need to make the sale for his personal satisfaction, not merely for the sake of his commission. The sale helps him fulfill his personal need.

Most salesmen possess these two qualities but many times they are not in balance resulting in misunderstandings between himself, his customers and his company. It is only when there is proper balance between empathy and ego drive that one can see the dynamic synergistic effect that results in more, and better quality, sales.

The authors discuss why, generally speaking, recruitment procedures, entrance tests and experience cannot guarantee hiring a good salesman. They posit that when the emphasis is put on experience, more than on empathy and drive, what is accomplished "can only be called the inbreeding of mediocrity."

They conclude that industry can improve its ability to select and train competent salesmen by zeroing in on and developing the qualities of empathy and ego drive.

Managing for Business Effectiveness

Peter F. Drucker

The first duty of the business manager is "to strive for the best possible economic results from the resources currently employed or available."

Drucker defines the major problem of business effectiveness as the confusion between effectiveness and efficiency. He says, "There is surely nothing quite so useless as doing with great efficiency what should not be done at all."

He claims that while 90% of the results are being produced by the first 10% of events, 90% of the costs are being increased by the remaining and result-less 90% of events, and believes that costs are a "social phenomenon." He points out that economic results are, by and large, directly proportionate to revenue, while costs are directly proportionate to number of transactions.

The manager should attack the problem of increasing business effectiveness systematically — with a plan of action, with a method of analysis, and with an understanding of the tools he needs. The end products of the manager's work therefore are decisions and actions, rather than knowledge and insight, with the crucial decision being in the allocation of efforts. He cites examples and step-by-step programs for addressing both the problems and the desired end results in the article.

Drucker concludes that no matter how painful, one rule should be adhered to: "in allocating resources, especially human resources of high potential, the needs of those areas which offer great promise must first be satisfied to the fullest extent possible."

Computer Data Bases:

The Future Is Now

Richard L. Nolan

There has been considerable debate among specialists about what a data base is, if such a thing exists at all; about the elements of information that ought to go into it; about the administrative complexities created by the concept; and about the real value of the concept as the central organizing principle for a company's EDP operations.

Nolan presents this dilemma facing management in the form of a simplified case study that allows the reader to work through the problem of establishing a data base, its effects and its integration into company activities. He also discusses briefly data-base administration and the role of the administrator.

He traces the traditional pattern of the management of data generally used by companies and contrasts it to the more modern concept that centralizes corporate and management information into a central data pool through a data-base interface system with specialized programming applications. Three data-base strategies are pinpointed as "brute force", "piggy-back" and "key task".

What should management do? Nolan lists five things. Firstly, take the idea of EDP data base seriously. Second, set up data administration function. Third, incorporate data-base technology into the computer system. Fourth, think of data as a resource.

And, fifth, estimate your own company's position in the evolutionary sequence. If you find that your company is still at a rudimentary stage of development, plan for development. If your company is fairly advanced, press forward a little harder. The only thing to lose is redundancy.

already entertaining the thought of postponing the gathering as most areas with insufficient drainage were flooded and not for a minute did the skies rest. (This writer recalls having to scoop out water from a gold-fish pond six times during the day.) However, Bro. Ed Locsin of the Peace Fellowship reiterated that doing so would just be giving in to the desires of the enemy, stressing that worship should go on even with just a handful.

The Unity Worship commenced with the praying of the Holy Rosary by a few hundred early birds that swelled to over 5,000 at the beginning of the hour-and-a-half praise and worship that followed. As heavy rain endlessly battered the roofs of the coliseum, so did about 10,000 feet batter the floors in song and dance as young and old, unmindful of the storm, continued to commune with the Lord in praise and worship.

The gathering culminated with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist by Bacolod Bishop Camilo D. Gregorio and some priests from the diocese. In a most appropriate sermon, the bishop stressed unity as the highest expression of our being community, and unity as the highest expression of love that Christ expects of us if we are to be His real and faithful followers.

The bishop called on everyone to pray hard for unity, and to pray harder for the love of unity that Jesus had in John 17:21 when he prayed: "That all may be one as You, Father, are in me and I in you. I pray that they may be one in us, that the world may believe that you sent me."

Myth of the Well-Educated Manager

J. Sterling Livingston

Livingston claims that many highly intelligent and ambitious men are not learning from either their formal education or their own experience what they most need to know to build successful careers in management. Furthermore, he believes that there is no direct relationship between performance in school or training programs and records of success in management.

It seems that classroom teaching theories and strategies tend to limit the manager's ability to learn from his experience. Many crucial managerial tasks are left to be learned on the job, but few managers ever master such tasks because no one in the corporate jungle takes time out to teach them how.

One skill that managers must learn in order to build successful management careers is the skill of problem finding as well as how to overcome the "analysis paralysis" hangover from the classroom. This goes hand-in-hand with the critically important talent for opportunity finding.

Opportunities are not exploited and problems are not solved, however, until someone takes action and gets the desired results. This requires a natural management style that the manager must learn how to use in a way that is consistent with his unique personality. Artificial styles don't usually work in the long run, claims Livingston.

The author presents three characteristics of men who learn to manage effectively: the need to manage, the need for power, and the capacity for empathy. He concludes that managers must not only have

the intelligence needed to absorb the necessary education, but also have the capacity to learn from their own firsthand experiences. If they can do neither, they will be only second-rate managers.

The well-educated manager is a myth because management is more than just a formal education. A true manager is one who is able to integrate his formal education with native intelligence and common sense and experience.

Decision Trees for Decision Making

John F. Magee

This is a precise article discussing the concept and practical use of decision trees in management planning and decision making. The article abounds with visual examples and illustrations as well as data tables with analytical content. How to treat uncertainty alternatives is discussed.

Magee believes that "today's decision should be made in light of the anticipated effects it and the outcome of uncertain events will have on future values and decisions." Such decisions should balance economy with flexibility as well as the need to capitalize on profit opportunities that may exist with the capacity to react to future circumstances and needs.

A unique feature of the decision tree is that it allows management to combine analytical techniques such as discounted cash flow and present value methods with a clear portrayal of the impact of future decision alternatives and events. As management becomes more adept in using decision trees, it can consider various courses of action with greater ease and clarity.


In the article's appendix, Magee gives further examples and illustrations of decision-tree structures that typify a management's analysis of decision-requiring alternatives in setting up a new plant facility and in plant modernization.

IT WAS ONLY years ago when I joined the renewal and in the weeks that followed, I first heard about that word — "tithe." A brother from Cebu came over for a special talk to enlighten us about the subject. When the talk was still halfway through, I already developed a lot of resentments. Bro. Al-al recalls that he observed me during that time and in his own words described me as "nanikad na nga mo-walk-out".

During the days that followed that subject was the only thing that I talked about. Questions persisted. On whose authority were they collecting this money? Why dictate to me when I should give, how much and where? Why the 10 percent and 10 percent of what? —the gross or the net income? And what happens to the money that we give? I did some research and could not even find the word "tithe" in the Documents of the Vatican II. I was troubled and disturbed.

What great manifestation of His magnificent living presence!

And true enough when the huge crowd left the coliseum after another set of praise songs rendered by the BCBP music ministry, the skies were silent.

Random acts of kindness are those little sweet or grand lovely things we do for no reason except that, momentarily, the best of our humanity has sprung, exquisitely, into full bloom.

Most of us try hard to fulfill our obligations in life, to be responsible parents, to reward and discipline our children, to assist our employees or colleagues, to support and comfort our spouses, to do our share of the work at the office and at home. But these deeds are what we're expected to do, what in fact we have agreed to do because of the mates we have chosen, the lives we have decided to live. They come, in effect, with the territory.

But it is when we step outside the arena of our normal circumstances, when we move beyond the familiar emotional and circumstantial boundaries of our lives that our kindnesses, too, move beyond the routine and enter the realm of the extraordinary and exquisite. Instead of being responsible good deeds they become embodiments of compassion.

To become the perpetrator of random acts of kindness, then, is to become in some sense an angel. For it means you have moved beyond the limits of your daily human condition to touch wings with the divine. No longer circumscribed by "can" and "must", you have set your soul free to give for the sheer, beautiful sake of true giving. In giving freely, purely, for no reason and every reason, you move into another person's emotional landscape — not because you must, not because you have no choice, but because in your heart, you have felt the spiritual necessity of acting out of your love.

One would think people would want to develop a closer relationship with the Judge; but ignoring him when one has the opportunity to visit him is not exactly a smart thing to do.

The question on where we should give our tithe can be explained logically. We cannot eat at Jollibee and pay at McDonald's. So, I should give where I get my spiritual nourishment.

And, lastly, the question of what happens to the money I give, this should not be a problem. What is given is already given! I can not anymore claim ownership of what has already been given.

So now, my brothers and sisters,
I am untroubled. I return to God 100
percent of the sufferings, the trials and
the pain He has given me. But with
regards to the material possessions, He
has abundantly provided me, I only
return a small percentage to Him in the
form of my tithe of it. #





In general, what relates to our Lord Jesus Christ has two aspects. There is a birth from God before the ages, and a birth from a virgin at the fullness of time. There is a hidden coming, like that of rain on fleece, and a coming before all eyes, still in the future.

At the first coming he was wrapped in swaddling clothes in a manger. At his second coming he will be clothed in light as in a garment. In the first coming he endured the cross, despising the shame; in the second coming he will be in glory, escorted by an army of angels.

We look then beyond the first coming and await the second. At the first coming we said: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. At the second we shall say it again; we shall go out with the angels to meet the Lord and cry out in adoration: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

The Savior will not come to be judged again, but to judge those by whom he was judged. At his own judgment he was silent; then he will address those who committed the outrages against him when they crucified him and will remind them: You did these things, and I was silent.

His first coming was to fulfill his plan of love, to teach men by gentle persuasion. This time, whether men like it or not, they will be subjects of his kingdom by necessity. Malachi the prophet speaks of the two comings. And the Lord whom you seek will come suddenly to his temple: that is one coming.

Again he says of another coming: Look, the Lord almighty will come, and who will endure the day of his entry, or who will stand in his sight? Because he comes like a refiner's fire, a fuller's herb, and he will sit refining and cleansing.

These two comings are also referred to by Paul in writing to Titus: The grace of God the Savior has appeared to all men, instructing us to put aside impiety and worldly desires and live temperately, uprightly, and religiously in this present age, waiting for the joyful hope, the appearance of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. Notice how he speaks of a first coming for which he gives thanks, and a second, the one we still await.

That is why the faith we profess has been handed on to you in these words: He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

Our Lord Jesus Christ will therefore come from heaven. He will come at the end of the world, in glory, at the last day. For there will be an end to this world, and the created world will be made new.

Life is full of meaning and purpose. It is full of beauty beneath its covering. I pray that this Christmas you will discover that earth is only a cloak for heaven. All we need then is courage this Christmas—courage to claim the heaven which is in the midst of our earth. That courage is God's Christmas gift to us who are pilgrims together wending our way home through a strange country.

So this Christmas, I send you greetings. They are not exactly the kind of greetings the world sends. But I send them to you with great love and with the prayer that for you this Christmas and forever the day will break and the shadows will flee away.
